Today, number of initiatives are bringing many destinations and tourism products into global spotlight.

GIR ROARS

exponential growth of tourist flow in the Hotel Gir Forest, rising up beside the Hiran River, does not look very different from other riverside resort hotels in India. But for the stakeholders in Gujarat's Tourism Industry, this hotel, opened in October 2011 by reviving a closed Taj hotel, is a landmark that reflects the growth in tourism that the Gir Wildlife Sanctuary has experienced in the hotel was run as the Lion Safari Lodge by Tourism Corporation of Gujarat Ltd in the 1980s and '90s before being taken over by the Taj Group and renamed as Gir Lodge. When Taj closed operations of this property in 2005-06, many felt this marked the end of tourism in Gir. "Today, we have re-opened this property under The Gateway brand

because we believe that Gir is a big destination in Gujarat and with our experience in the leisure segment, we feel we can explore its full potential", says P K Mohankumar, COO of The Gateway Hotels, "Since we have hotels in three cities of Gujarat, Gir is a logical extension of the state's experience". The property has been given a makeover with improved interiors, modern conveniences and a pleasantly located river-facing swimming pool. One of the highpoints of the property is the lounge upstairs looking out to a panoramic view of the river and forested hills.

Located in the Saurashtra region of Gujarat, Gir Wildlife Sanctuary and National Park together encompass an area of over 1312 sq km, comprising deciduous and scrub forests, grasslands and water bodies. This wildlife reserve is the only protected habitat of the Asiatic lion, which numbers 411 according to the 2010 lion census, and most visitors do get to see one over a two or three stay at one of the properties in or around Sasan, the headquarters of the Gir National Park and Wildlife Sanctuary. It is also one of the likely places to see a leopard, with the census yielding a substantial figure of over 300 in the reserve. The permissible driving routes in the Gir Wildlife Sanctuary go through a cross-section of habitats, populated by spotted deer, sambar and other species. This sanctuary is known for its crocodile population and rich birdlife.

"Considering all this, I was surprised during my visit to Gir in 2003-04 to find very few places to stay compared to many of the Tiger Reserves in India," says Mohit Aggarwal who owns Asian Adventures. "My company specializes in birdwatching and natural history group, Gir was like a missing link in the wildlife circuit of Gujarat, which has resorts near other important bird sites like the Little Rann of Kutch. Yet, this is the wildlife reserve, where I have really enjoyed going for wildlife viewing drives – there is a lot of drama because of the large population of both prey and predators, and you keep tracking pugmarks of lion or leopard, listening to alarm calls of deer or langur that rent the air. It is good for watching eagles, vultures and other birds". Looking at the potential, Aggarwal says he met Naveen Modha who owns a mango orchard in an enviable location along the sanctuary boundary. They collaborated to start Gir Birding Lodge in 2004-05. "The fruit trees in the complex bring in birds from the sanctuary's forests and balconies of the farmhouse look out to the wildlife in the sanctuary. So we decided to specialize largely in offering facilities for natural history enthusiasts, like birdwatching guides, safari arrangements and field guides to birds", says Aggarwal.

Like Aggarwal, Ranjit Singh Parmar of Palaces of India realized that Gir was a gap in the Gujarat itinerary because of paucity of guality accommodations. Parmar shares, "If Africa is known for its Big Five, India is the land of three big cats - Tiger, Lion and Leopard. Gir is the only site for the lion in Asia and a top site for the leopard in India. Gujarat's neighbouring states of MP and Rajasthan have India's most productive tiger sighting areas, therefore a good tour is possible to see wildlife in Gujarat and its neighbouring states. This was not being exploited". As Parmar specialized in palace hotel bookings, he decided to start a company called Camps of India, with properties in Gir and other wildlife reserves targeting upmarket travellers. Designed and developed like an African safari camp, this property on the river shores started in November 2004 has luxe tents among shady trees. "This move has paid off as Gir has become a big destination", says Parmar, adding, "The increased facilities of niche resorts has helped bring international tourists to Gir".

While Gir was earlier largely visited by foreign tourists and wildlife enthusiasts, it is now becoming a destination attracting weekenders from Gujarat and holiday tourists from other states, believes Mahesh Dhudakiya of Shakti Travels. This is the reason why Shakti Travels has started the Vanvaso Resort on the river-shores near the sanctuary. "When we started work on building Vanvaso a few years ago, with



recreational facilities for families like swimming pool, children's amusements, coffee shop, etc, many felt we were making a mistake in investing in Gir. However, since we have a lot of tour group movement of our own in this part of Gujarat, we believed there was a need for such a property. We are now happy with our decision", says Dudakiya. He believes that the publicity received by the park has helped – the news reports of good census records with rising lion and leopard populations, and the visits of important dignitaries including former President Pratibha Patil and the then-Chief Minister and present Prime Minister Narendra Modi, being cases in point. "Another huge impact has been the Khushboo Gujarat Ki advertisement campaign on Television, which shows Amitabh Bachchan watching lions in Gir. This has caught the imagination of many families all over India specially because Gir is close to the holy temple town of Somnath, the Island of Diu, the magnificent Jain temples of Girnar and historic Junagadh

making a complete holiday experience of wildlife, culture, heritage, beach and pilgrimage". Sanjeev Chajjer, Vice President of Cox and Kings, agrees, "Gir has become a hot destination for families in Ahmedabad, and many are now opting for weekends in this and other wildlife reserves, because there are good resorts and the places have received publicity".

The Fern resort in Gir has even incorporated a spa, a swimming pool, recreational areas, conference and banquet facilities, party lawns, performance areas, in the resort keeping this market in mind.

"From a few places to stay in Gir five years ago, we now have about 40 accommodation options, including hotels, resorts, lodges, camps and guesthouses, enough to satisfy various tourist categories from school groups to honeymooning couples", says Mukesh Mehta, owner of the Gir Jungle Lodge.





THE GOLDEN WHITE BEACHES DESERTS OF KUTCH

One of the greatest success stories of Gujarat is the phoenix like growth of Kutch after the 2001 earthquake that destroyed thousands of houses and buildings. Today, Kutch is known for its ports, industrial parks and fast growth of tourism.

One of the major events in Kutch promoted by Gujarat Tourism, Rann Utsav promises the unique experience of visiting the vast open desert, travelling across open desert plains in a camel cart during the sunset, and watching a full moonlit folk concert on the shimmering white desert landscape. This annual event offers the opportunity to visit a stretch of the Great Rann of Kutch, the expanse of salt-encrusted white desert that lies along the India-Pakistan border. The festival also spotlights the rich culture of Kutch, a district of Gujarat that is shot through by the brilliant colours of the embroidery, tie-dye and block-printed fabrics that are produced by craftspeople of the villages that fall between the desert wilderness of the Rann of Kutch and the beautiful sea beaches lining the Gulf of Kutch.

The district capital, Bhuj, offers an introduction to Kutch in its monuments, museums, markets and craft parks. Bhuj's 18th century Aina Mahal and 19th century

Pragmahal palaces have richly painted and decorated interiors that offer an insight into the craftsmanship of Kutch. It also has fascinating collections of art, archaeological finds, musical instruments, historic artifacts and shipping displays at the Kutch Museum and folk art exhibitions at the *Bharatiya* Sanskriti Darshan.

A short distance from Bhuj, the village of Bhujodi is a centre for *pitloom* weaving, embroidery and woodcarving. Further down the same road are Ajrakhpur and Dhamadka, known for their vegetable dye block-printing and exquisite *Ajrakh* craft. Dhaneti is the place, where *Ahir* women do fine embroidery. Place like Padhhar is known for its embroidery work. While Ningal is famous for its single ikat silk weaving. The Crafts Resource Centre at Kukma and the town of Anjar are the centres for *bandhani* tie-dye and metalcrafts.

North of Bhuj, the grasslands of *Banni* are scattered with villages of pastoral groups. As the women of these groups do embroidery for their personal use and a second income, this is one of the highest concentration areas of craftswomen in the world. In Banni, the *Sodha Rajputs* practice the *Sindhi* styles of *suf*, *khaarek*, and *paako*, while Islamic pastoral groups like the Jaths and Mutwas have their own ethnic styles of embroidery. The Hindu pastoral groups like the Rabaris also have their distinct embroidery style. It is possible to tour a number of villages, like Hodka, Dhorodo, Gorewali, Ludia and Bhirendiara, in the Banni region by staying at Hodka or Dhordo.

Travelling west from Bhuj, the road leads to Nirona, which is the centre for the rare art of rogan, now practiced only by the family of Khatri Abdulgafoor Daud, who has won a national awards for this art. Rogan is the art of painting fabrics using castor oil-based colours. Much work goes into creating the castor-oil based paint, which is then rubbed between palms to create a stringy gooey paste from which the colour can come off on an iron rod or wooden stick like threads. He and his nephews create rogan masterpieces for wall hangings and decorations, sarees, tablecloths, skirts, etc in silk and cotton clothes. At Nirona and nearby villages like Zura, it is possible to see `Vada-kaam', the work of carpenters who create wooden products, which they lacquer in various colours, and the making of melodic bells, cast in iron and covered with copper.

Continuing from here, the road leads to the ancient Buddhist site of Siyot - the fortified



town of Lakhpat best known for its historic Gurudvara. Places like the sacred lake of Narayansarovar, divine temples, heritage village of Tera, historic fort, holy mosques, and an interesting water-harvesting system lure the attention of any visitor.

The western talukas of Kutch like Nakhatrana and Abdasa are among the best birdwatching areas in India. The Lala Sanctuary and the grasslands and scrub that surround it, support endangered birds like the Great Indian Bustard, Black-naped Tit, Stolikza's bushchat, White-backed and Long-billed Vultures, and the Lesser Florican, while the Chhari Lake and its surrounding grasslands form one of the most important highways for migratory birds. This is also the only region in India where the Grey Hypoculius is seen. Besides birds, the Narayan Sarovar and Lala Sanctuaries also support endangered mammals like wolf and gazelle, while the beaches are used by sea turtles for breeding.

The southern limits of Kutch district forms the northern coast of the Gulf of Kachch. This coast has fine stretches of beach, fruit and palm grove, and bird-rich creeks. The

key destination is Mandvi, about 50km from Bhuj airport, which has the majestic Vijay Vilas Palace and beautiful beaches. Once a major port, Mandvi still supports a thriving dhow-building industry at its creeks. It is a market for the handicrafts produced in nearby villages. There is a deluxe tented beach resort in the palace estate. Toward Ashapura beach and Pingleshwar, which has a good beach, coastal birdlife and sea turtle nesting areas.

The main focal point of Eastern Kutch is Dholavira, the excavations that provide an insight into the Indus Valley or Harappan Civilisation, which was specially mature about 2500-1900BC. This site shows the town planning of the period, specially the sanitary drainage systems and the water-harvesting structures, like reservoirs, wells and canals, that were surprisingly sophisticated for the period. The smoothed stone columns, signboard and microbeads are some of the unique finds at Dholavira. There is also a large public area of the kind seen at few Indus sites. Gujarat Government is planning to construct an airstrip to connect Dholavira to the national tourism network.

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RELIGIOUS TOURISM

Gujarat's major destinations are its pilgrimage destinations. Along the northwest tip of Saurashtra, Dwarka is one of the holiest temple towns for all Hindus and part of the *Char Dham Yatra*. The coastal road from Dwarka leads to Somnath, one of the 12 *Jyotirlingams*. Recent promotions have led to rising tourism in both these temple towns, resulting in growing facilities like hotels and restaurants.

While both Dwarka and Somnath are situated on the coast of Saurashtra, the hilltop temple sites of Shatrunjaya over Palitana and Mount Girnar outside Junagadh are among the most important religious destinations for Jains. Ambaji in the Aravalli hills is one of the 51 *Shaktipiths* revered by all Hindus. Gujarat also has the most sacred *Parsee* fire temple in India at Udvada.

Since accommodation is the mainstay for Tourism to thrive, Gujarat's new policy for home stay facilities is a promising move. We are now working to open many of these houses for tourists who will get to eat the family's home style food and stay in these heritage properties". From *havelis* in Ahmedabad to palatial properties in Kutch and Saurashtra, or even village homes, many appropriate properties are being opened for tourists by operators. "Professionals will train house owners willing to open their residential premises for tourism in various aspects of the Hospitality Industry so that they can provide a comfortable experience for the visitors, who will also get a better feel of local culture," says Sanjay Kaul, MD of Tourism Corporation of Gujarat Ltd.

Gujarat also boasts an outstanding collection of heritage hotels that offer character-rich accommodation facilities in renovated palaces, castles or colonialperiod mansions near many destinations of architectural, historical or ecological importance. These converted properties represent the heritage of princely and mercantile families of Gujarat, a state positioned on the west coast of India that has enjoyed maritime trade with overseas countries since millennia. The prosperity of the state during the medieval and British

colonial period resulted in it having a high concentration of princely and petty states, some of which were among the wealthiest in India, ruled by Maharajas, Nawabs and Thakore Sahebs, who commissioned palaces and mansion guest houses in Islamic, Hindu or European styles, even a fusion of various architectural elements that are noted for the grandeur of their facades and interiors. During the colonial period, the merchant families built for themselves mansions ranging in style from courtyard houses called havelis, from fine stonework and woodcarvings, to European-style mansion residences. The result of the building activities is a wealth of architectural buildings that can be seen while travelling through Gujarat.

Making the most of their living legacy, many of the owners of these architectural buildings have converted them into heritage hotels with sympathetic restoration of the facades and renovation, keeping with the history of the property to offer their guests an insight into the culture, cuisine and lifestyle of Gujarat's landed gentry besides an attractive accommodation base from which to explore the countless places to see in the state.

From the wonders of Western Ghats to exquisiteness of Vidarbha Forest, the diversified geographical location of the state makes it inflated with the diverse wildlife like Tiger, Crocodile, Bison, Gawa, Neelgai, Wild Deer, Sambars and rare migratory birds.

The state is an abode to four major tiger reserves, six national parks and 36 wildlife sanctuaries. So accelerate and explore tiger reserves like Tadoba, Melghat, Pench and Sahyandri, visit the Mowgli Land and enjoy the beauty of the backwaters of Totladoh Lake in Pench National Park.

Pench Tiger Reserve

Travel around the scenic land of the Pench Tiger Reserve, situated near the southern reaches of Satpuda hills. Spanning across 257 sq. km of area, the reserve's natural beauty has inspired great short story-writer Rudyard Kipling for his renowned work – The Jungle Book. The national park is an astonishing blend of the shady trees and backwaters of Totladoh Lake.

The '25th Tiger Reserve of India' has the highest herbivores in India along with 164 species of birds, 33 species of mammals, 10 species of amphibians, 30 species of reptiles, 50 species of fish and a wide variety of insect life. Tiger, Jungle Cat, Dhole, Leopard, Small Indian Civet, Striped Hyena, Jackal, Sloth Bear and common Palm Civet represent the carnivore fauna of the reserve.

The best seasons to unfold wildlife safari of Pench National Park are Winters (December to February) and Summers (March to May). Both seasons lead to change the safari time due to varying daylight hours. Safari in Winters is allowed from 07.00 AM to 10.30 AM and 02.00 PM to 05.30 PM. While for Summers, the entry starts from 06.30 AM to 10.00 AM and 03.00 PM to 06.00 PM*.

Tadoba-Andhari Tiger Reserve

An infinite treasure trove of numerous species of trees and plants, Tadoba-Andhari Tiger Reserve was developed under the 'Project Tiger'. The reserve is an amazing formation of Tadoba National Park, also known as 'The Jewel of Vidharbha' and Andhari Wildlife Sanctuary. The Project Tiger land comprises of 1727.6 sq. km of area with the core area 625.82 sq. km and the rest 1101.78 sq. km.

Located in the district of Chandrapur in Maharashtra, wildlife of the reserve includes around 65 of the keystone species Bengal tiger and mammals like Indian Sloth Bears, Leopards, Nilgai, Gaur, Dhole, Small Indian Civet, Striped Hyena, Sambar, Jungle Cats, Barking Deer, Spotted Deer, Chausingha and Chital and reptiles like Indian Python, Terrapins, Indian Star Tortoise, Indian cobra and Russell's viper. The reserve has recorded 195 species of birds and 74 species of butterflies.

Best time to visit the reserve is during February to May. If you're flying, Nagpur is the nearest airport with 140 km distance. The nearest railway station is Chandrapur, which is at a distance of 45 km.

Umred-Karhandla Wildlife Sanctuary Bound by the Wainganga River and the Gosikhurd Dam, Umred Karhandla Wildlife Sanctuary is positioned at a distance of 58 km from Nagpur.

The sanctuary, covering 180 sq. km, is a home to resident breeding Tigers, Gaur, Wild Dogs and also rare animals like Flying Squirrels, Pangolins and Honey Badger. The wildlife sanctuary is abundant with 29 species of mammals, more than 180 species of birds and 26 species of reptiles. In 2009, Umred-Karhandla was identified as a sanctuary with the source population of tigers.

There are 3 gates, Karhandla, Pullar and Gothangaon, to enter the sanctuary. Safari from Karhandla gate can be booked in advance from Maharashtra Tourism website. **Navegaon-Nagzira Tiger Reserve** Plan a tour to Navegaon-Nagzira Tiger Reserve if you are a crazy bird-watcher. Feel the proximity to Mother Nature through its scenic landscapes. The reserve, spread over 152 sq. km of area, has inspired many authors like Mr. Vyankatesh Madgulkar and Mr. Kiran Purandare to write books on

Nagzira.

Navegaon-Nagzira Tiger Reserve has a good population of herbivorous. Wildlife of the reserve includes Wild Dogs, Tigers, Leopards and mammals like Spotted Deer, Barking Deer, Four Horned Antelope, Indian Guar and Gliding Squirrel. One can cherish various types of fishes in the Nagzira Lake and have an awesome birdwatching experience with the presence of 166 species of birds like Gray-Headed Fish Eagle, Orioles, Woodpeckers, Owls, Eagles, etc. Teak, Arjun, Dhawda, Moha are some of the dominant floras of the reserve. The best time to visit the sanctuary is in Summers i.e. from March to June, when tiger sightings are at their peak.

Positioned at a distance of 22 km from Sakoli on the NH 6 (Bombay – Calcutta), Gondia is the nearest railway station to visit Navegaon-Nagzira Tiger Reserve.

Melghat Tiger Reserve

Melghat Tiger Reserve is nested on the northern extreme of the Amravati District on the border of Madhya Pradesh. The tiger reserve encompasses an area of 1,676.93 sq. km, which includes the 788.75 sq. km area of Melghat Sanctuary and the 361.28 sq. km of Gugarnal National Park in the Vidharba region of Maharashtra. The area is known for its natural beauty ornamented with the splendor of craggy hill forests and shady trees. The beautiful manifestation of nature makes Melghat Tiger Reserve a must-visit place.

The main attraction of the reserve is the tigers that stay quite interior of the forest. It is also well-known for Leopard, Nilgai, Sloth Bear, Sambar, Wild Dog, Jackal, Gaur, Chital, Barking Deer, Ratel, Flying Squirrel, Rhesus Monkey, Wild Boar, Chausingha, Pangolin, Mouse Deer, Porcupine, Python, Langur, Blacknaped Hare and Otter. The reserve, a paradise for carnivorous birds, has recorded 250 species of birds. Hawk-Eagles, Owls, Vultures, Crows, Rufous, The Golden Oriole, Gold-mantled Leafbird, Grey Francolin and Jungle Bush Quail are some of birds enriching the reserve's beauty.

Plan a trip to Melghat Tiger Reserve during December to May. Akola is the nearest airport, which is 160 km away from the reserve. Badnera is the nearest railway station. If you're driving, Melghat Tiger Reserve is at a distance of 230 km from Nagpur and 100 km from Amravati.

Bird Centuries

Maharashtra is embellished with many species of birds. Bulbul, Cuckoo, Parakeet, Shama, Wagtails Flycatchers, the great Indian Bustard, Purple Sunbirds, Grey Jungle Fowl Drongos and the adorably stunning Peacock. Bird sanctuaries like the Radhanagari Wildlife Sanctuary in Kolhapur, Karnala Bird Sanctuary near Matheran and Mayani Bird Sanctuary near Vaduj are the epitome of the great bird-watching experience.

BEYOND

Goa is a lush green paradise, in its true sense. With the promises of the shimmering beaches, azure waters and crimson sun and palms, Goa is a tourist destination three hundred sixty five days a year. This tiny state situated on the west coast of India, between the borders of Maharashtra and Karnataka, is better identified to the world as the former Portuguese enclave on Indian soil. Today, some of the most beautiful beaches in the world are located here.



Little Bit of History

In 1510, the Portuguese defeated the ruling Bijapur sultan Yousuf Adil Shah with the help of a local ally, Timayya. They set up a permanent settlement in Velha Goa or Old Goa. This was the beginning of Portuguese rule in Goa that lasted for four and a half centuries, until 1961.

After India gained independence from the British in 1947, India requested that Portuguese territories on the Indian subcontinent be ceded to India. Portugal refused to negotiate on the sovereignty of its Indian enclaves. On December 19, 1961, the Indian Army began military operations resulting in the annexation of Goa, Daman, and Diu into the Indian union. Goa, along with Daman and Diu, was organized as a centrally administered union territory of India. On May 30, 1987, the union territory was split, and Goa was made India's twentyfifth state, with Daman and Diu remaining a union territory.

Goa is India's smallest state by area and the fourth smallest by population. Goa is India's richest state with a GDP per capita two and a half times that of the country as a whole. Panaji is the state's capital, while Vasco da Gama is the largest city. The historic city of Margao still exhibits the cultural influence of the Portuguese, who first landed here in the early 16th century as merchants and conquered it soon thereafter. Goa is visited by large numbers of international and domestic tourists each year for its beaches, places of worship and world heritage architecture. It also has rich flora and fauna, owing to its location on the Western Ghats range, which is classified as a biodiversity hotspot.

Pilgrimage Tourism

Goa is famous for its 16th and 17th century churches. These places of worship have been architecturally influenced by the Gothic styles of the Middle Ages and the baroque styles of the Renaissance. Most of the churches are located in old Goa. Hence no visit here is complete without a visit to Old Goa, the Golden Goa of the 16th century, when it was the "Rome of the Orient". Magnificent churches, sumptuous buildings, stately mansions and broad streets once characterized this 8 sq. km land. Among the many splendid buildings of Old Goa, the Se Cathedral (Cathedral of St. Catherine) remains one of the greatest monuments of the period. It was completed in 1619 and till date is the largest Christian church in Asia.

Within the compound of the cathedral lies the Church of St Francis of Assisi with a stucco ceiling and a plethora of carvings. The inner sides of the buttressed walls have been designed with frescos of intricate floral designs. These have been painted in a hybrid style combining Indian and European elements. Another church that is worth visiting is the Church of St. Cajetan. With its two belfries and cupola in the centre, it was modelled on the Basilica of St. Peter in Rome by its Italian architect. Also near the river bank stands the Chapel of St. Catherine built on the site of the bitterest fighting during Albuquerque`s conquest of Goa in the year 1510. The church of St. Anne is another popular destination for the Christians who come from various countries to offer their prayer here. The Basilica of Bom Jesus located in old Goa is of great religious significance. It is a World Heritage Monument in India. The church is renowned all over the world for the preserved mortal remains of St. Francis Xavier. He was the member of Society of Jesus and came to India to spread Christianity with the Portuguese. Every year thousands of people visit the cathedral especially in the month of December.

Hindus also form a considerable part of the population in Goa. There are many temples which are of utmost religious importance. Sri Mangueshi temple at Ponda in Goa is the most well-known among temples. It is one of the most visited religious centers of the Hindus. Shri Mahalakshmi temple at Bandora is regarded as the dwelling place of the original Goddess of the *Shakti* cult. Its significance lies in the fact that it was the first Hindu temple to be built in this Indian state.



Nature Tourism

Goa is a nature lover's dream destination. Visitors holidaying in Goa can take pleasure in the large assortment of waterfalls, parks, and popular wildlife sanctuaries. Goa is a luxuriant natural bliss bounded on the one side by the foothills of the Sahyadri range and on the other by the Arabian Sea. Goa is gifted with lakes, waterfalls and springs of abundant beauty. They are situated far from the hustle and bustle, away from the coast, in the interiors.

There are three major waterfalls of Goa which emerge from great heights and flow through the uneven terrains. These three rippling streams of silvery water draw innumerable tourists who desire idyllic solitude of secluded nature. The Arvalem waterfall of Goa looks stunning with the roaring cascade of water gushing down the rocky topography of the mountain behind it. The Dudhsagar fall is one of the most interesting falls of India and the largest and highest fall of Goa. The Kesarval waterfall is another magnificent spectacle for the nature lovers.

Dolphin Cruise

While in Goa, you can have a very special experience of small-group dolphin-watching cruise. As you cruise along the Arabian Sea, you can brightly coloured kingfishers and watch dolphins perform acrobatics and frolic below you. You can also see Fort Aguada, a former Portuguese fort and prison set high up on rocks, and take a dip in the sea — you may even get to swim with a dolphin!

Beach Tourism

Goa's beaches cover about 125 km. of its coastline. These beaches are divided into North and South Goa. North Goa is more commercialized with an abundance of low and medium budget tourist accommodations; whereas South Goa is where most higher-end hotels and private beaches are located. A notable exception in South Goa is Palolem Beach which features basic accommodation and is one of the most visited beaches in Goa. Some of the more popular beaches of South Goa are Angoda, Benaulin, Bogmalo, Canaguinim, Cavelossim, Colva, Majorda and Mobor. Similarly the most visited beaches of North Goa are Anjuna, Arambol, Baga, Bambolim, Calangute, Candolim, Chapora, Dona Paula, Miramar and Morjim. Many of these beaches are lined with shacks that provide fresh sea food and drinks. Some shacks arrange special events to attract more tourists.

Beautifully positioned on the bank of the magnificent Rudra Sagar Lake in Ujjain, Mahakaleshwar dominates the life of the city in a significant way through its finely sculptured *Shikhara* (peak). The striking decoration of the shrine represents the rich past rituals and traditions. Many *purans* have intensely depicted the divinity of Mahakaleshwar.

Originally built by the great King Vikramaditya, the sacred temple is divided in three segments. The below segment is the shrine of Mahakaleshwar. The divine *lingam* of the Lord Shiva is believed to be born of itself here. The Lord Omkareshwar rests in the middle portion of the temple. While the Snake God, Nag Chandereshwar, resides in the uppermost portion.

Mahakaleshwar has been one of the top 10 *tantra* temples of India as it has south-facing idol of God. Mahashivratri leads to a huge religious fair with a loud chanting of '*Om Namah Shivay*'. The unique offering of ash or *vibhooti* to Lord Shiva at Mahakaleshwar known as *Bhasma Aarti* is one of its kind in the world.





The Unique Offering - Bhasma

The destructor of the universe, Lord Shiva, is believed to reside in the cremation ground and very fond of ash i.e. *bhasma*. It is believed that offering of *bhasma* ensures acceptance of the prayer.

Conducted as the first ritual every morning, *Bhasma Aarti* takes place to awake the Lord Shiva. With the ash billowing in the air of the divine temple, the beautiful and exhilarating chants of praises to the lord, the harmonious sound of cymbals and the religious people drowned in the prayers, attending mesmerizing *Bhasma Aarti* is an impeccable feeling for the devotees of Lord Shiva.

Bhasma Aarti is renowned for its offering of ash to Lord Shiva. The tradition of *Bhasma Aarti* has been followed from the time immemorial. In *Dwapar* and *Sat Yuga*, the *bhasma* was brought from the funeral ashes of *Aghoras* from the cremation ground. The hot *bhasma* was showered on the *jyotirlinga*. Nowadays, the ash obtained by burning cow dung in a sacred fire is offered to Mahakaleshwar.

The Enchanting Bhasma Aarti

When in Ujjain, reserve your morning time from 4 AM to 6 AM for the enthralling *Bhasma Aarti* at the *Garbha Griha* of Mahakaleshwar. Get carried away with the captivating sounds of cymbals, *damroo*, conchs along with the harmonious vedic chants and *stotras*. The beautiful ambience, where the Lord is beautified with the *bhasma* by 10 *Naga sadhus*, demands unstitched clothes like *dhotis*. Be a witness of the process of transforming each speck of sanctum into *bhasma* starting from the head monk's offering of the holy ash to the *shivlingam*. Get billowed in the air with the mesmerizing and uplifting blend of the *bhasma*-filled sanctum and the continuous loud chanting. The beautiful amalgamation of the two will surely hypnotize you. Though women are not allowed to enter the *Garbha Griha*, all devotees can offer their prayers sitting in the *Sabha Griha*. As Mahakaleshwar is a famous *tantra* temple, *bhasma aarti* holds great importance for the *tantriks*.

How to reach:

Pack your bags and explore the well-connected city through railway, roadway or airway. Ujjain is situated in the state of Madhya Pradesh at a distance of about 180 km from the state capital, Bhopal. The nearest airport is in Indore, 53 km away from Ujjain. The city has direct trains from major cities of India. Ujjain is connected to Indore through SH-27 and SH-18.

Where to stay:

MP Tourism has two hotels - Shipra Residency and Hotel Avantika (*Yatri Niwas*). Shipra Residency is a 3-star accommodation, while Hotel Avantika (*Yatri Niwas*) is a budget accommodation. Gujarat contributes 31% of country's Health Care Industry. The well-connected state has excellent infrastructure and airport facilities. It is relatively litter-free and less polluted. The state has good strength of NRGs (approx. 32% of NRI diaspora), which leads to increase the number of medical tourists in the state. Besides, the state's colorful fairs, festivals, distinctive lifestyle, attires and cuisines act as blissful respite for the patients.

Talking about the areas of improvement, the state needs more investments in high-end technologies like cyber knife or robotic surgery. Gujarat should be well-connected to the countries like Africa through frequent direct flights.

Negligible presence of internationallyaccredited hospitals hampering the growth of Gujarat's medical tourism. Please share your views

International accreditation like JCIaccredited hospitals in Gujarat would be an added advantage. Patients from developed countries like USA prefer to get treatment through JCI-accredited hospitals. Since 1999, JCI has accredited more than 140 hospitals in 27 countries. Some countries are adopting their own accreditation standards. For instance, India is practicing QCI stamp NABH-accredited hospitals on elaborative aspects and extensive measures of quality of patient care. If we implement best practices under NABH banner along with the quality patient-care (both Medical & Non Medical), we are at par. The pool of well-trained, highly-skilled and English speaking Medical and Non Medical staffs apart from foreign certified doctors will increase the level of satisfaction in patients. The opposite will lead to reverse the effects.

Focusing on the future of medical tourism, are there any scope of improvements in terms of government's efforts, infrastructural development, well-trained human resource or etc.?

Yes, there are many issues that require attention to stimulate the growth of India's Medical Tourism Sector. Like...

- Improving visa rules
- Dealing with traffic congestion problem on roads and airport by marking separate lanes for medical ambulance, resulting in reducing travel time from airport to hospital
- Forming more relaxed rules on foreign currencies for medical travelers
