Ujjain Simhastha 2016 A Resounding Success of Faith



fter a gap of 12 years, the supreme spirituality of the Simhastha Kumbh, once again, adorned the city of Mahakaleshwar from April, 22nd to May 21st, 2016. Simhastha reached pinnacle of success when

as many as 7.5 crore pilgrims visited the month-long fair and over 1.50 crore devotees took the holy dip during the last Shahi Snan. Rising to the challenge, the arrangements made by

the state were unprece-

dented in scale. Keeping in mind the management and security of the massive crowd, the extensive area was divided into six zones and sixteen sectors. Officials appointed around twenty-five thousand police officials, twenty

bomb detection and disposal squads along with twenty-five quick response teams during the monthlong event. The grandiose festival of faith was controlled by the means of a series of watchtowers, RFID tags, headcount



cameras, satellite imagery and mobile-based crowd density estimation.

An ephemeral spiritual city was constructed during the Simhastha Kumbh in Ujjain spreading over the four thousand hectares of land. As per another high-tech move, the fair was equipped with strong GIS-based arrangements. Simhastha was declared as the 'cashless mela' with the installation of more than 100 ATMs in the fair area. Special arrangements were made for the differently-abled like e-rickshaw to Mahakal and Ramghat along with separate toilet arrangements for them in the Simhastha area. Authorities made all the necessary efforts for a hassle-free visit of the devotees.



STDC carried out works worth Rs. 24 crore for Simhastha in Ujjain

Madhya Pradesh State Tourism Development Corporation had undertaken a number of important works pertaining to infrastructure and facilities for Simhastha-2016. The infrastructure development works included construction of hotels, development of public amenities, etc. to present better facilities to the devotees. The corporation executed various works, creating total 108 rooms and two dormitories (16 beds) and two dormitories (8 beds) at the cost of Rs. 24.93 crore.

In view of Simhastha, the state tourism board



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upgraded and expanded Hotel Kshipra and Hotel Avantika. In all, the STDC upgraded 28 more rooms and added 20 rooms to Hotel Kshipra. Similarly, in Hotel Avantika, 12 rooms and 2 dormitories (32 beds) were upgraded and 6 new rooms and 2 dormitories of 8 beds each were constructed at the cost of Rs. 6 crore. The construction work for Hotel Ujjayani

costed around Rs. 9 crore for 32 rooms, a restaurant, 2 conference halls, kitchen and residences for its staff in its premises.

M.P. Tourism established one main media centre, one major centre, 14 sub-media centres and 2 satellite towns at the cost of Rs. 7 crore for Simhastha. Main media centre was set up in Dutt Akhada Zone, while major centre was in Mangalnath Zone.

The State Tourism Development Corporation played its role in the international and national level branding for Simhastha- 2016. The Corporation designed a special publicity bus. The bus covered several cities of the country since April, 2015 and distributed the promotional and information materials for the Simhastha.

The resounding success of Simhastha has once again proved that the right mix of strategy, planning and guidance, on the part of the government and the administration coupled with self-discipline, faith and devotion of the people are capable of great success at the occasions like Simhastha.

or most travellers, the quintessential Goa is only about beaches. However, if you travel east from the coast to the Western Ghats, you will find lush forests affluent with birds and butterflies, impressive waterfalls and lesser-known gems like the medieval Tambdi Surla temple and ancient cave sites that survived the Portuguese invasion because of their remoteness. Monsoon is the time to enjoy the lush greenery and impressive waterfalls of Goa's Western Ghats.

At the eastern edge of Goa, the Dudhsagar Waterfalls is one of the top attractions of the state. This spectacular waterfalls is among the highest in India, dropping about 600 *m* along the face of the cliff. Dudhsagar means the River of Milk, derived from the white foam created by the force of the cascade as it drops in tiers, forming pools on the way. The falls lie in the middle of forests with fantastic birdlife. ፆ

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The waterfalls is part of the Molem forests, which has the Bhagwan Mahavir Wildlife Sanctuary. This sanctuary is home to a variety of wildlife, including leopard, Indian bison, giant squirrel and a variety of birds. Not far from the sanctuary, Tambdi Surla has small but exquisite Mahadev Temple. This Shiva Temple was built in the 12th-13th century period, when Goa was ruled by the Kadamba dynasty. The fine reliefs and sculptures on the shikhara roof include Brahma, Vishnu and Shiva with their respective consorts. The temple is in a compound with fig trees that draw beautiful birds of the hills.

West from Tambdi Surla, the road leads to the Bondla Sanctuary with a zoo and some good forests. Trails in the forests are excellent for butterfly and bird spotting. From Bondla, travel to Priol-Ponda Road in Goa's midland, which is covered with plantations. Some of the spice plantations, like Tropical, Savoi and Sahakari offer garden tours that include a Goan lunch. During the tour, you are shown various spices, herbs and fruits grown on the plants. The tour usually ends with watching men swinging among the areca palms to harvest betel nuts. However, this part is excluded in the wet weather. If you travel to northeast, you can come to the Bicholim and Sattari





talukas of Goa that are barely developed for tourism. Start from Sanquelim with its 19th century temple. Turning east from here, come to the waterfalls at Arvalem. Shaded by rocks and hills, this waterfalls is formed by the end of a gorge and is barely visible till you actually reach them. Since the river was in spate during the rains, the waterfalls was extremely impressive.

Near the falls, a cluster of five rock-cut temples were hewn out of





laterite rock by Buddhist monks in the third to sixth century AD (though some opine that they were created in the first century) and later were converted for Shiva worship. The Shaivite cave temples have granite Shivalings.

The Mhadei Wildlife Sanctuary in the Mandovi river basin is part of a Global Biodiversity Hotspot – the sanctuary is declared as an Important Bird Area by Birdlife International and is considered an area of high Endemism by Conservation International. From the smallest to the largest of butterflies, huge moths, mantids, nymphs and diverse insect



fauna are found here.

Drive west from Valpoi to Mayem Lake surrounded by wooded hills. Continue to Arpora by the Baga River, which yields good sightings of kingfishers, ibises, sandpipers, stints and other waterfowl. The paddy fields near the river are good for the Asian openbill stork, paddyfield pipit, Malabar crested lark, ashy woodswallow and ashy prinia. In the woodlands, you could see such beauties as the Indian pitta,

paradise flycatcher, tickell's blue flycatcher, orangeheaded thrush and flameback woodpecker.

Travel south towards Cotigao Wildlife Sanctuary, which lines the southern corner of Goa just before the Karnataka border. On the way, you can see the Usagalimal Petroglyphs, a series of rock engravings on the banks of River Kushavati. An Archaeological Survey of India staff member showed us a paper that states that this rock art could be 20,000 to 30,000 years old, though he told us that some experts believe it was about 9000-10,000 years old. He pointed out images of bulls, labyrinths and human figures carved on laterite stones. Nearby is an ancient Buddhist cave.

Continue south to the Cotigao Sanctuary, another place with rich forests inhabited by leopard, sambar, barking deer, flying squirrel and civet. The sanctuary is the best place for watching Western Ghats endemic birds. Story by ANIL MULCHANDANI

Matheran in Monsoon a heaven near Mumbai





Matheran (literally 'forest on the forehead' of the mountains) is the smallest hill station in India. The unique thing about the place is that there are no vehicles allowed – you can either walk or take a horse. This keeps the hill station in its pristine state.



ocated at a distance of just 83 km (by road) from Mumbai and 120 km from Pune, Matheran is no less than heaven on earth. Though it is the preferred destination during winters, the hill station in the rains is the best for those who enjoy walking through the forest trails and discovering the ever changing monsoon flora.

Matheran is well-connected by railways, roads and air. Neral, 59 km from Matheran, is the nearest railway station. There are lots of local taxis that can take you to Dasturi Park, the last point beyond which no vehicle is allowed.

Once you reach Neral, the toy train journey to Matheran is a pleasant and

enjoyable picturesque experience. To cover the distance of 20 km, the train takes around 2-3 hours with numerous halts, which give enough time to the travellers to enjoy the valleys and beauty of Matheran. The service is not available during the monsoons. However, it makes a good and easy trekking path all the way up to Aman Lodge. In fact, monsoon treks up to Matheran are quite popular, though it is prudent to choose the easier routes.

There are approximately 36 'Points' in Matheran with each one offering a distinct and splendid view of the valley below. Some of the major tourist attractions in and around Matheran are Alexander Point, Rambag Point, Big Chowk Point, Belvedere Point, One Tree Hill Point, Olympia Race Course, Charlotte Lake, Lords Point, Celia Point, Pisharnath Mahadev Mandir, Mayra Point, Louisa Point.

Mount Berry, where a toy train chugs up the hill in the lap of nature's unspoiled, verdant environs, has a picturesque beauty. Ancient Pisarnath Temple near Charlotte Lake is for the devout while your vocal chords can get boomeranged at the picnic spot here called Echo Point.

The natural beauty of Matheran is explored through the long-walks. The land covered with thick green shrubs that shabbily carpets the mountain floor, the soggy earthy smell, the magic of mist, the melody of streams and the transformation of water'falls' into water'rise' due to the forceful wind will give you some of the best moments to capture.

Apart from the natural splendors, you can view some heritage structures in old British-style architecture and several old and abandoned bungalows, most of them belonging to the Parsees.

Maharashtra A Coastal Paradise

Apollo Bunder, Mumbai



Start your coastal tour from Mumbai's Gateway of India, which was the first sight, travellers saw when they landed in British India. Built in 1911 to celebrate the visit of King George and Queen Mary, this gate commands a spectacular view of the sea. From here, you can take the boat to Elephanta Island with splendid rock-cut caves that have some of

India's finest stone carving. Walk along Apollo Bunder for sea views and see the Gateway illuminated at night. Also worthseeing after dark is Marine Drive, named 'the Queen's Necklace' for its glittering streetlights lining

Called Konkan in Marathi, this picturesque strip of land offers a pretty drive through rolling hills and along paddy fields, with virgin beaches and historical forts not far away from the highway. This area is known for its Konkani and Malvani food using fresh vegetables, jackfruit, coconut, kokam, spices and the daily catch of seafood.

About 17 km from Kashid, Murud Janjira is a picturesque coastal town with Gothic houses and the palace of the Nawab of Junagadh. Murud has some nice beaches. From here, you can visit the magnificent fort of Janjira on an island 500 m offshore.

From Murud Janjira, continue south along the Mumbai-Goa Highway through the Western Ghats to Mangaon. From Lonere Phata near Mangaon, turn for Dapoli following a road that runs through lush green hilly countryside. Around Dapoli, you can enjoy views of sandy beaches, rocky coasts, harbours, blue seascapes and fishing hamlets. One of the best beaches here, Murud Harnai is located near a fishing harbor. The Harnai beach is excellent for walks, and operators offer water sports and beach activities here. Dolphin spotting is possible here.





From Harnai, return to the highway and travel to Ratnagiri, a port city bordered by Sahyadri mountains to the east and the Arabian Sea to the west. This city has a fort, the Thibaw Palace, where King Thibaw who ruled Burma (now Myanmar) from 1878, was exiled. The city is the birthplace or native home of many distinguished people like Lokmaya Tilak. Just 22 km from Ratnagiri, Ganpatipule is a beach with long stretches of pristine sands and clear waters. It gets its name from the Swayambu Ganpati Temple, which is about 400 years old. This beach is a popular tourist destination with many hotels and resorts. Near the beach are groves of mango, banana, jackfruit, coconut and betel nut trees.

South of Ratnagiri, the southern Konkan coastline is studded with pretty beaches, picturesque fishing villages and marine ports. Vijaydurg Fort was first built in the 11th century, but the present structure was largely built in the 16th century by the Sultans of Bijapur. The fort was extended by Maratha ruler Shivaji, with fortifications and 27 bastions. From this fort,







Kanhoji Angre's Maratha forces plundered British shops. The coastal area here, which falls in Sindhudurg district, has many good beaches and nesting sites for sea turtles. Sindhudurg itself has an island fort built by Chhatrapatti Shivaji with high ramparts. This area called the Malvan coast comprises a Marine National Park. It is a popular area for scuba diving and snorkeling.

The finest beach in Sindhudurg, Tarkarli has a long coastline and clear waters. Located at the confluence of the Karli River and the Arabian Sea, this is the destination where you can find stunningly beautiful beaches, rolling hills, backwaters and river at one site, besides the proximity to historical sea forts. There are safe waters for swimming and soft white sands for relaxing and walking. With its growing popularity, Tarkarli is wellfacilitated with hotels, restaurants and shops selling Konkani products. You can even stay in a houseboat. Vengurla, 56 km south, is also a good beach destination. 23 km east of Vengurla, Savantwadi was the capital of a small princely state ruled by the Bhonsle dynasty. The palace here now houses a handicraft center, where you can watch artists at work. Savantwadi is also known for its dolls. This area has cashew and other plantations. Amboli, northeast of Savantwada, is a pretty place in the Western Ghats. 📼

A Culinary Trail in Royal Rajasthan

The meat feasts of the Rajput princely states and the rich vegetarian food of the Marwari mercantile make Rajasthan an exciting destination for food tourism. Today, many palaces, castles, havelis and old houses opened as heritage hotels offering an opportunity for the tourists to enjoy the traditional cuisines of the rich and the royal state.

Start with Udaipur, where there are some of India's finest palace hotels like the Lake Palace, Shiv Niwas Palace and Fatehprakash Palace, as well as a number of haveli hotels like Jagat Niwas, Udai Kothi and Amet Haveli that specialize in offering Rajput favourites. Laal Maas is







one of the iconic dishes of Rajasthan's princely states. The Jungli Maas - mutton cooked with ghee, red chillies and a little water - was developed by Rajputs for meals at the field or on the hunt. The signature kebab of Mewar is the Maas ke Suley with marinated flattened meat threaded on to skewers and charcoal barbecued. The rich dishes developed in the palaces liberally use khoya, nuts, curds, cream, and often kewra or rose-water. Safed Maas or Malai Maas are some of the specialities. Makki ka Soweta has meat with makki (corn), while Bajara ka Soweta is a spicy mix of meat and millet. One of the iconic names in Mewari food of Udaipur is the Bedla family that has leveraged their royal recipes and

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cuisine styles to build a firm called Karan Cuisine. Bedla states, "My great-grandfather, Rao Bahadur Karan Singh was widely reputed for his culinary skills. Under his guidance, many of Mewar's well-known specialities were created. We continued to be the official hosts of Mewar when dignitaries like Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru, Queen Elizabeth II, the Shah of Iran and Jacqueline Kennedy visited Udaipur. Since people from different parts of the world visited the princely states, the cuisines combined many influences". Bedla House even has accommodations for those who want to stay for long periods to learn cooking or relish the food.

During the corn season, Makki ki Ghaat, Makki ki Raab and Makki ki Saag are extremely popular in Mewari houses.

Further north from Udaipur, Deogarh Mahal is known for its

Mewari cuisine. Says Rani Sahiba of Deogarh Mahal, "At Rajput weddings in Mewar, dry meats like Kacher Maas, Murg Ko Khatto - which is a chicken dish in a curd-based gravy, Sohitos, comprising mutton or pork with bajra, are musts. Fresh water fish is also served. Meats are sometimes pickled. Many of these recipes are featured in our menus and guests enjoy learning how to make some of them." Just a few kilometers from Deogarh, Amitvikram Singh, who runs heritage hotels in Jojawar, says, they offer many house specialities to the tourists. "When hunting was banned through the Wildlife

The Thakur describes some game meat dishes, he cooked using traditional styles and 'masalas'. The women of the family have added non-vegetarian and vegetarian recipes to our repertoire. My elder sister took a team of chefs for food festivals in Switzerland, and my wife and I have held many food festivals in many large hotels of India", he says. Sodawas specialities are Sekula Murg (open-fire barbecued chicken), Akhni Mutton Pulao, Pachkutoh (a mix of vegetables),

recipes, which he serves at Karni

Makhiya Hari Meerchy (chillies mixed with dairy products) and Papad Re Chutney.

Sidharth Singh of Rohetgarh, one of the iconic heritage hotels of the Marwar region, agrees that royal cuisine adds value to the heritage property. "My mother, the late Jayendra Kumari, wrote books on quick and easy Rajasthan recipes and also the more elaborate cuisines of Rohet Garh. We now serve these at Rohet Garh and Wilderness Camp, and also have cooking workshops. Guests love the Maas ka Sula, Bhuna Gosht, and vegetarian dishes like Hara Tamatar. The Dal-Baati is a dish everyone identifies with Rajasthani cuisine, but we have one with a special dal. We even serve Maas Baati with meat instead of dal". Rohet Garh is on the global luxury gourmet list: with horse safaris and royal picnics serving signature cuisine on crested cutlery, it has jet set celebrities on the guest list. Jhalamand Garh, another heritage hotel in the outskirts of Jodhpur, is known for Thakur Raghvendra Pratap Singh's own cooking of authentic Rajasthani cuisine, specially his barbecues.

A local speciality of the Marwar desert region is the Ker Sangri-

berries from the desert scrub and bean pods of the prosopis tree cooked in ghee, onion, garlic, curd, mango powder, chillies, fenugreek and spices. Govind Gatta, Gatte ki Sabzi or Chakki ki Sabzi with chickpea dumplings is commonly served in Rajasthan. Dana Methi ki Sabzi is made with fenugreek seeds. Other dishes of this arid semi-desert region are the Moranga ki Sabji, Motha ko Saag, Badi Saag, Papad ki Sabji and Rabori ki Sabji.

In the city of Jodhpur, Mogri Kachori with moong dal, Pyaz Kachori with onions and the sweet Mawa Kachori are extremely popular in the bazaars. Near the Clock Tower, try the famous Mirchi Bada and Shahi Samosa. Lapsi is popularly served sweet-dish at weddings. The desert region of Jodhpur-Jaisalmer – Bikaner is rich in milk products like Makhaniya Lassi and Kadai Doodh.

In Jaipur, a royal-themed fine dining restaurant named - 1135 AD has become an iconic place to eat in the Amber Fort. It has become a must visit for bon vivants, who come to Rajasthan to live and dine like princes. When 1135 AD was ready, the first visitor was the late Maharaja. In the city centre, LMB has become famous for its Rajasthani



snacks and sweets. At night, many visitors to Jaipur head out to theme restaurants like Chokhi Dani, Aapno Gaon and Surabhi Restaurant (which has a turban museum) for Rajasthani food in a setting to match. North of Jaipur are a number of heritage hotels famous for their home-style Rajasthani food. Shivarjun Singh of Mandawa says the Royal Repast is one of the top selling points for their properties, Mandawa Castle and the Desert Resort. "In Mandawa, we serve the Shekhawati Platter, a meal comprising many Shekhawati specialities. Popular at the Desert Resort is the Maas ka Sula, made with strands of meat strung together; when the string is pulled, the delicate pieces of meat fall out", he explains.

The Freedom Trail From Amritsar to The Andaman Islands

Soak in the spirit of Independence Day by visiting historic landmarks handpicked by us that formed an integral part of India's freedom struggle.




THE FREEDOM TRAIL





- 1 The Jallianwala Bagh in Amritsar is the public park, where a crowd of nonviolent protesters, pilgrims and Baisakhi celebrators were fired upon by British troops on the command of Colonel Dyer on 13th April, 1919. This massacre awakened masses in India to protest against the brutality of the British Raj in India.
- 2 A memorial to the Jallianwala Bagh Massacre designed by an American architect, the bullet marked walls and the well into which many people

jumped and drowned attempting to save themselves from the bullets are the main historical relics in the Amritsar public park.

3 The fort of Jhansi was besieged by the East India Company in 1858 when Rani Lakshmi Bai refused to give in to the British and marshaled her forces to fight back. She was able to make a daring escape on horseback from the fort when it was taken by the British forces.



- 4 The Jhansi fort has granite walls with many gates and temples, and the Kadak Bijli cannon used in the uprising of 1857. It is a memorial to Rani Lakshmibai's valour in fighting back against the British company forces.
- 5 The Rani Mahal was built by Raghu Nath-II of the Newalkar family (1769-96) and formed one of the residences for Rani Lakshmibai of Jhansi. It was damaged by British bombardment during the Indian Rebellion of 1857.
- 6 The Lucknow Residency was the home of the British representatives in the court of the Nawab of Awadh. In 1857, the place witnessed a prolonged battle called the Siege of Lucknow, which began on 1 July and continued until 17 November.

- 7 The Sabarmati Ashram in Ahmedabad was the base from where Mahatma Gandhi launched his struggle for India's freedom between 1917 and 1930.
- 8 The Hriday Kunj at Ahmedabad's Sabarmati Ashram was one of the residences of Mahatma Gandhi who lived there for about twelve years along with his wife, Kasturba.
- 9 The Gandhi Smarak Sangrahalaya is a museum and public service institution at Mahatma Gandhi's Sabarmati Ashram. It was designed by Charles Correa and is an appropriate memorial to the life of Mahatma Gandhi.
- 10 The Salt March to Dandi was the most significant organized challenge to British authority. When Mahatma Gandhi protested against the salt act by leading the march to Dandi, it had a significant effect on changing the world and British attitudes towards Indian sovereignty and self-rule.







- 11 Mahatma Gandhi led the Dandi March. 78 people began the march with Gandhi, who intended to walk 240 miles (390 km) to the coastal village of Dandi, which was located at a small town called Navsari in the state of Gujarat. As Gandhi and the others continued on what would become a 24-day march to Dandi to produce salt without paying the tax, growing numbers of Indians joined them along the way. When Gandhi broke the salt laws at 6:30 am on 6 April 1930, it sparked large scale acts of civil disobedience against the British Raj salt laws by millions of Indians.
- 12 Mani Bhavan was Gandhiji's base for the Independence struggle in Mumbai. The famous August Kranti rebellion calling for Quit India was launched in Mumbai in 1942.
- 13 Mani Bhavan is maintained as a memorial to Mahatma Gandhi's political activities in Mumbai from 1955. It has a library with statue of the Mahatma, where people offer their tributes, a staircase spanned by photos of Gandhiji, his simple possessions in his former bedroom, and a hall where photographs and paintings of his lifetime displayed. Climb to the terrace where he was arrested on Jan 4, 1932.
- 14 Mani Bhavan is closely associated with Mahatma Gandhi's involvement with the home rule movement and his political activities in Mumbai. It is here that he began to abstain from drinking cow's milk in order to protest the cruel and inhuman practices meted out to the cattle.















- 15 The Aga Khan Palace in Pune was a prison for Kasturba Gandhi, Mahatma Gandhi and Sarojini Naidu. This is also the place, where Kasturba Gandhi and Mahadev Desai died. Prince Aga Khan donated this palace to become a memorial to Gandhi's freedom movement.
- 16 Bal Gangadhar Tilak, called Lokmanya Tilak, was described by the British as the father of the Indian rebellion. His birthplace at Ratnagiri is now a museum.
- 17 The Tilak Ali Museum at Ratnagiri speaks of the freedom struggle.



- 18 The Gandhi Memorial Museum in Madurai, established in 1959, is set in a former palace.
- 19 The Gandhi Memorial Museum in Madurai showcases "India Fights for Freedom" with 265 illustrations, depicting the history of the Freedom Movement, a visual biography of Bapuji, and historical relics.
- 20 Madurai is the place, where Mahatma Gandhi renounced his attire to wear only a dhoti. Here he also campaigned the cause of opening Meenakshi Temple for all castes. In 1946, he entered the Meenakshi Amman Temple after it was opened to Harijans.
- 21 The Cellular Jail at Port Blair was used by the British to exile freedom fighters to the remote islands of the Andaman & Nicobar.
- 22 Hunger strikes by the freedom fighters during the early 1930s called attention to their imprisonment. Mahavir Singh, an associate of Bhagat Singh protested the inhuman treatment meted to the prisoners and sat on hunger strike. He was force-fed milk, which went into



his lungs and he died. He was tied to a stone and thrown into the sea. After Mahatma Gandhi and Rabindranath Tagore intervened, the British Government decided to repatriate the political prisoners from the Cellular Jail in 1937-38.

This place can be a treat for the History buffs and one can be as lost as a kid in a candy store. Tourists can visit not just palaces, but museums, tombs and mosques - each with their own tale.

Palaces

Built by Ba Ahmed, the El Bahia palace is beautifully built with numerous rooms and lovely Eastern architecture. It is said that the rooms were used by Ba Ahmed's concubines. Beautiful colored tiles, lavishly decorated rooms, marble and exquisitely designed arches are the features that define the Bahia Palace the name literally meaning "Palace of the beautiful". Besides the 150+ rooms in the palace, you can visit the beautiful gardens surrounding it.

The El Badi palace is in ruins owing to the various wars and destruction it has seen but nonetheless, is mindblowing. The sheer size of the palace with its 300+ rooms can really mesmerize one. It is said that in its glory days, the palace was studded with gold, precious stones, ivory and marble. Today, though none of these exist, one can walk through the palace gardens and see the various sites including the dungeons where the prisoners were kept by the Sultan.

Tombs

The dead were left forgotten for some time and the Saadian tombs sealed by one of Marrakech's rulers -Moulay Ismail, who was also, responsible for destroying the El Badi palace. Wanting to etch his own history, Moulay Ismail sealed all the entrances to this beautiful tombs, except for the one in Kasbah mosque. Originally built by Sultan Ahmed el Mansour, the tombs are resting place of the Sultan and his family. The tombs have lovely arches, marble carvings and mosaic flooring. The tombs, surrounded by a beautiful garden, were lost for a while till a French General Hubert Lyautey re-discovered them. There has been a lot of restoration work since then. Today, they are the most popular tourist destination in Marrakech.

Mosques

A landmark of Marrakech, Koutoubia mosque is easily identified with its tall minaret of 69 meters in height. Though not open to non-Muslims, one can admire the same from outside. The mosque itself is huge and is said to have



a capacity of 25 thousand worshippers. It is beautifully lit in the night, making it a very popular photography subject. Atop the minaret are four globes, with the fourth globe having an interesting legend. It is said that the reigning Sultan's wife felt guilty of eating 3 grapes during Ramazan and hence, to absolve the same, got a Golden globe made from her jewelry for the minaret.

Besides these heritage sites, there are plenty of museums and galleries

within Marrakech. A popular one amongst them is the Marrakech Museum, which is housed within an old palace. Other important ones include Dar Si Said and Bert Flint Museum.

Menara Gardens

Menara Gardens in Marrakech are beautiful gardens overlooking the Atlas mountains with Olive trees, palms and an artificial tank of water. There is a lovely pavilion along the tank. Built in the 12th century by an Almohad ruler, this is an oasis within the city. Majorelle Garden is the most popular Moroccan gardens - popularly referred to as the artists' gardens. A botanical garden was designed by the French artist Jacques Majorelle with marble pools, bamboos, palms, cacti and more. It was later re-designed by the famous designer Yves Saint Laurent and Pierre Berge. The garden is famed for the fact

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that the ashes of the designer Yves Saint Laurent were scattered through the garden. The garden is an absolute treat for the nature lovers.

Being at the foothills of Atlas mountains, one can even opt for a day's outing to the Atlas mountains. There are plenty of tours available for the same.

For the Shopaholics

Spending some time in the oldest market of this city - Djemma El Fna can be quite an experience in itself. You might feel as if you are a part of a scene from Aladdin or one of those Arabian nights stories. Djemma El Fna is one of its kind, a UNESCO heritage site - a gypsy market of sorts -from hawkers to tattooist and henna artists , snake charmers, fortune tellers and more. The square is full of drama - from dawn to night. There are some lovely street side cafes for one to relax and watch the market transform. Along the sides are the souks or markets that offer authentic Moroccan specialities like shoes, spices, carpets, perfumes and trinkets. The Moroccan lamps, wood and metal artifacts are also quite unusual and a good buy for gifting and souvenir purposes.

Marrakech is known for its tanning artifacts. The jackets and handbags are worthbuying. But remember to bargain hard.





For the Foodies

Again, there is no avoiding the Djemma El Fna square, when it comes to food. With the best of Arabic food, this square has lots of cafes and restaurants to offer for both vegetarians as well as non-vegetarians. There are some amazing food tours in Marrakech that help you decide and sample the authentic cuisine of Marrakech.

Among the many delicious dishes, try out the Harira or the lamb soup as well as the Orange juice. There are various kinds of olives available here and it is worthwhile to sample them as they are quite unique. The Moroccan dates are recommended as well. Try out their traditional dish made of Semolina – Couscous, which is generally eaten with meat or vegetables.

Getting to Marrakech

- Marrakech has an international airport with very good connectivity to most major cities in Europe. There are plenty of flights available, including low cost airlines.
- Airport is located within 5-6 km from the city and there are plenty of taxis available for this intercity travel. The travel fare from airport to city approximately costs between MAD 50-70, depending on the place you wish to go to.
- Moroccan Visa is not required for European visitors, looking for a stay up to 3 months. Other nationalities might require the same.

Travel Tips

- Spring (March to May) and Autumn (October -November) are the best times to visit Marrakech. Light cotton clothes would work well during these times. It is advisable to keep a light shawl along with you, especially when visiting the religious places to cover bare shoulders owing to their cultural sensitivity.
- While street food can be tempting, be cautious as it may not be hygienic in some places. Take advice of a local guide or a food tour before attempting it on your own.
- As Friday is a public holiday in Marrakech, some places might not open at all.
- Though Arabic and French are their official languages, Marrakech does well with English too.
- People in Marrakech are quite friendly. However, do keep a guard on while visiting public places as they are not devoid of pick-pocketers.

New civil aviation policy 2016 Key features you must know

he Minister of Civil Aviation, Shri P. Ashok Gajapathi Raju released the National Civil Aviation Policy 2016 in New Delhi on 15th June, 2016. This is the first time since independence that an integrated Civil Aviation Policy has been brought out by the Ministry. Speaking on the occasion, Shri Raju said that the centre-piece of the policy is to make regional air connectivity a reality. The policy aims to take flying to the masses by making it affordable and convenient, establish an integrated eco-system which will lead to significant growth of the civil aviation sector to promote tourism, employment and balanced regional growth, enhance regional connectivity through fiscal support and infrastructure development and enhance ease of doing business through deregulation, simplified procedures and e-governance.

The policy is very comprehensive, covering 22 areas of the Civil Aviation sector. Its salient features are as follows:

Regional Connectivity Scheme

- This scheme will come into effect in the second quarter of 2016-17
- Airfare of about Rs. 2500 per passenger for a one-hour flight
- This will be implemented by way of:
 - Revival of airstrips/airports as No-Frills Airports at an indicative cost of Rs. 50 crore to Rs. 100 crore
 - Demand driven selection of

Airports/airstrips for revival in consultation with state govts and airlines

- Viability Gap Funding (VGF) to airline operators
- RCS only in those states which reduce VAT on ATF to 1% or less, provide other support services and 20% of VGF
- Concessions by Stakeholders
- There will be no airport charges
- Reduced Service tax on tickets (on 10% of the taxable value) for 1 year initially
- Reduced Excise duty at 2% on ATF picked at RCS airports
- State government will provide police and fire services free of cost. Power, water and other utilities at concessional rates
- Creation of Regional Connectivity fund for VGF through a small levy per departure on all domestic flights other than Cat II/ Cat IIA routes, RCS routes and small aircraft below 80 seats at a rate as decided bythe Ministry from time to time
- VGF to be shared between MoCA and state governments in the ratio of 80:20. For the Northeastern states, the ratio is 90:10

Route Dispersal Guidelines (RDG)

 Category I to be rationalized based on a transparent criteria, i.e., flying distance of more than 700km, average seat factor of 70% and above and annual traffic of 5 lakh passengers

- The percentage of Cat.I traffic to be deployed on Cat.II, and IIA will remain the same while for CATIII it will be 35%. Routes to Uttarakhand and Himachal Pradesh included in Category II
- Revised categorization to apply from winter schedule of 2017
- There view of routes will be done by MoCA once every5 years
- Withdrawal or revision of domestic operations to and within North East Region etc, subject to full compliance of RDG, can be done under prior intimation to MoCA at least three months before withdrawal or revision of the service

5/20 Requirement

- Replaced with a scheme which provides a level playing field
- All airlines can now commence international operations provided that they deploy 20 aircraft or 20% of total capacity (in term of average number of seats on all departures put together), whichever is higher for domestic operations

Bilateral Traffic Rights

- GoI will enter into 'Open Sky' ASA on a reciprocal basis with SAARC countries and countries located beyond 5000 km from Delhi
- For countries within 5000 km radius, where the Indian carriers have not utilised 80% of their capacity entitlements but foreign carriers /countries have utilised their bilateral rights, a method will be recommended by a Committee headed by Cabinet Secretary for the allotment of additional capacity entitlements
- Whenever designated carriers of India have utilised 80% their capacity entitlements, the same will be renegotiated in the usual manner.

Ground Handling Policy

- The Ground Handling Policy/ Instructions/Regulations will be replaced by a new framework:
- The airport operator will ensure that there will be three Ground Handling Agencies (GHA) including Air India's subsidiary/JV at all major airports as defined in AERA Act
- At non-major airports, the airport operator to decide on the number of ground handling agencies, based on the traffic output, airside and terminal building capacity
- All domestic scheduled airline operators including helicopter operators will be free to carry out self-handling at all airports through their regular employees
- Hiring of employees through manpower supplier or contract
- Workers will not be permitted for security reasons

Airport PPP/AAI

- Encourage development of airports • by AAI, State Governments, the private sector or in PPP mode
- Future tariffs at all airports will be calculated on a 'hybrid till' basis, unless specified otherwise in

concession agreements. 30% of nonaeronautical revenue will be used to cross- subsidise aeronautical charges

- Increase non-aeronautical revenue by better utilisation of commercial opportunities of city side land
- AAI to be compensated in case a new greenfield airport is approved in future within a 150 km radius of an existing unsaturated operational AAI airport (not applicable to civil enclaves)

Aviation Security, Immigration and customs

- MoCA will develop 'service delivery' modules' for aviation security, Immigration, Customs, quarantine officers etc in consultations with respective Ministries/Departments
- Allow Indian carriers to provide security services to other domestic airlines subject to approval of BCAS
- Encourage use of private security agencies at airports for non- core security functions to be decided in consultation with MHA
- Such agencies should be registered under the Private Security Agencies (Regulation) Act, 2005 and will also be separately accredited by BCAS
- Subject to minimum benchmarks being met, security architecture at the different airports will be proportionate to the threat classification and traffic volume.

Helicopters and Charters

- Separate regulations for helicopters will be notified by DGCA after due stakeholder consultation
- MoCA to coordinate with Govt agencies and other helicopter operators to facilitate Helicopter **Emergency Medical Services**
- Helicopters will be free to fly from point to point without prior ATC clearance in airspace below 5000 feet and areas other than controlled or prohibited or restricted airspace

- Airport charges for helicopter operations will be suitably rationalized
- The existing policy of allowing Inclusive tour package charters will be further reviewed to include more categories of passenger charter flights recognised globally.

Maintenance, Repair and **Overhaul**

The MRO business of Indian carriers is around Rs 5000 crore, 90% of which is currently spent outside India. In the budget for 2016-17, customs duty has been rationalised and the procedure for clearance of goods simplified. Further incentives proposed in the policy to give a push to this sector:

- MoCA will persuade State Governments to make VAT zerorated on MRO activities
- Provision for adequate land for MRO service providers will be made in all future airport/heliport projects where potential for such MRO services exists
- Airport royalty and additional charges will not be levied on MRO service providers for a period of five years from the date of approval of the policy

Aviation Education and Skill Building

Estimated direct additional employment requirement of the Civil Aviation Sector by 2025 is about 3.3 lakh. All training in non licensed category will conform to National Skill Qualification Framework standards. MoCA will provide full support to the Aviation Sector Skill Council and other similar organisations/agencies for imparting skills for the growing aviation industry. There are nearly 8000 pilots holding CPL but who have not found any regular employment. MoCA will develop a scheme with budgetary support for Type- rating of Pilots. The detailed scheme will be worked out separately.

Interview



Shri Tapan Bhowmik Hon'ble Chairman Madhya Pradesh Tourism Development Corporation

Q. What are the new dimensions added by the 'Tourism Year 2015-16'?

- A. The year 2015-16 was declared as the 'Tourism Year' by the Government. There had been celebrations all over the state. To promote tourist destinations of Madhya Pradesh globally, MPT participated in many international road shows and trade events. The corporation also introduced several new initiatives to increase the domestic tourism, which are:
 - Caravan Tourism An innovative initiative to offer a unique travelling experience to the tourists. Caravans are the specially designed vehicles for the excitementseekers with carrying capacity of 8 adults.
 - Water Tourism MPT specially focused on promoting water bodies of the state. Cruises like Tawa-Madhai and Bargi-Mandla offer a beautiful ride through the jungles and natural landscapes.
 - Construction of new accommodation units at Kerwa Resort, Midway Treat Dodi and Highway Treat Handia undertaken.
 - Sound and Light Show launched at Rajwada, Indore.
 - The facilities at MPT hotels, Wayside Amenities etc. speak volumes for itself.
- Q. Madhya Pradesh Tourism has the reputation of being one of the most enlightened tourism departments of the country, publicizing its iconic destinations, constantly improving stay facilities and advertising in mass media to draw in domestic audiences. Do you think now is the time to focus on the 'out of sight' areas like Medical Tourism or Rural Tourism?
- A. Yes, it is high time to focus on the out of sight

areas like Medical Tourism or Rural Tourism. M.P. has a large tribal population that are engaged in making handicrafts, arts, etc. MPT is promoting these Arts and Crafts by establishing units at the remotest of places, where tourists can come and explore the hidden treasures of M.P. Wellness Tourism and Ayurveda are also on the cards.

- Q. Talking about new initiatives, 'Jal Mahotsav' - the first-ever water festival in the country was organized in February, 2016 to promote M.P. as a Water Tourism spot. How was the experience?
- A. Jal Mahotsav has been the first-of-its-kind Water Festival organized in the country. The 10-day affair was kicked off on 12th February, 2016 on a grand scale. The location chosen for the grand event was Hanuwantiya Island.

The dam and surrounding areas are beautifully developed by the MP Tourism with the objective of making it a popular tourist destination.

Jal Mahotsav offered everything from paragliding to enjoyable water sports. Other activities at the event included bird watching, treasure hunt, night camps, cultural activities, volleyball and tug of war. For the art lovers, there was a cultural treat in the form of numerous exhibitions. Craft bazaar, hosting mesmerizing artifacts, was setup. The event also consisted of a handloom center, handicraft shops and an exhibition on Simhastha 2016.

The interesting elements of the festival were its accommodation tents and mode of transportation i.e. bullock carts.

Q. What are the other significant initiatives of MP Tourism? And what are the projects/developments under way?

- A. Taking into consideration the rising number of tourists and the infrastructure needs of Madhya Pradesh, an ambitious plan has been chalked out to construct Wayside Amenities on highways. Introduction of this policy has generated new employment opportunities. Major highlights of the policy are:-
 - Development of the Wayside Amenities at the identified locations (Master Plan is ready)
 - Franchise model ready for operation and maintenance of Wayside Amenities
 - Three models of WSA Brown Field, Green Field and Franchise Model
 - Investors can take Brown Field and Green Field models on lease and conduct them

- Q. According to you, what are the major challenges faced by M.P Tourism in terms of infrastructure, government support, accommodation, branding and etc.? And what are your suggestions to overcome them?
- A. Potential for the travel and tourism industry in India is enormous. However, the industry faces numerous challenges, of which the most critical is the lack of proper infrastructure. Development of infrastructure for the travel and tourism industry such as roads, electricity, water supply, sewerage, telecommunications, accommodation, hotels and facilitation systems is significant.

To harness M.P. Tourism's potential, several initiatives are taken in the direction of developing new destinations and exploring niche segments. However, infrastructure facilities such as air, rail, road connectivity, and hospitality services at these destinations and the connecting cities are inadequate. This remains a major hurdle in the path of tourism development.

- Q. What are your views on the Madhya Pradesh Forest Department's (MPFD) proposal to start tourism in degraded forests outside national parks and wildlife sanctuaries in the state? Do you think this would have given a needed impetus to the state's tourism?
- A. Yes, the Madhya Pradesh Forest Department's (MPFD) proposal to start tourism in degraded forests outside national parks and wildlife sanctuaries in the state is commendable. If implemented, it would have drawn crowds, and given a needed impetus to the state's tourism.

Q. On a concluding note, is there anything else you would like to share with us?

A. Madhya Pradesh has set up the State's first Tourist Police Post at Pachmarhi and it is soon to be followed at other tourist destinations also. It is an important initiative taken by the government as a special force for the protection and benefit of tourists. These posts will provide information, security and assistance to domestic and foreign tourists visiting Madhya Pradesh. It will also help the tourists in case of any emergency, address the tourist enquiries, complaints and ensure that the language barrier does not hamper safety and security.

288 police personnel are trained as Tourist Police will be deployed at 12 tourist police posts across the state.

179.9% growth in tourists arrival on E-tourist Visa in May, 2016 over the same period in 2015

June, 2016 - USA continues to occupy top slot followed by UK and China amongst the countries availing e-tourist visa facility during May, 2016.

A total of 43,833 tourists arrived in May 2016 on e-Tourist Visa as compared to 15,659 during the month of May 2015 registering a growth of 179.9%.

Commencing from 27th November, 2014, e-Tourist Visa facility was available until 25th February, 2016 for citizens of 113 countries arriving at 16 Airports in India. The Government of India has extended this scheme for citizens of 37 more countries w.e.f 26th February, 2016 taking the tally to 150 countries. The following are the important highlights of e-Tourist Visa during May, 2016. The followings are the important highlights of e-Tourist Visa during May, 2016:-

(i) During the month of May, 2016 a total of 43,833 tourist arrived on e-Tourist Visa as compared to 15,659 during the month of May, 2015 registering a growth of 179.9%.

(ii) During January- May, 2016, a total of 4,34,927 tourist arrived on e-Tourist Visa as compared to 1,10,657 during January - May 2015, registering a growth of 293.0%.

(iii) This high growth may be attributed to introduction of e-Tourist Visa for 150 countries as against the earlier coverage of 43 countries.

(iv) The percentage shares of top 10

source countries availing e-Tourist Visa facilities during May, 2016 were as follows:

USA (18.52%), UK (15.63%), China (8.17%), France (5.16%), Germany (4.91%), Australia (4.50%), Canada (4.49%), UAE (3.01%), Russian Fed. (2.79%) and Malaysia (2.12%).

(v) The percentage shares of top Ten ports in tourist arrivals on e-Tourist Visa during May, 2016 were as follows:-

A number of projects have been received from various State Governments/Union Territory Administrations under the thematic circuits identified in the Swadesh Darshan Scheme. Projects are sanctioned subject to availability of funds, liquidation of pending utilization certificates against the funds released earlier, submission of suitable detailed project report and adherence to the relevant scheme guidelines.

Madhya Pradesh eyes Rs 1,300 cr. investment

Site for setting up seaplane jetty has been identified in all the destinations and currently design work is underway.

Centre plans to boost Cruise Tourism

The Hindu reported that the Centre is planning to promote cruise tourism with state-of-the-art infrastructure facilities across the nation. Bids from consultants have been invited to articulate an action plan. The current government is trying to accelerate the dedicated policy on cruise tourism, which has been in place since the time of the UPA-I government.

To make the Tamil Nadu more accessible and tourist-friendly, the Tamil Nadu Tourism Development Corporation (TTDC) is developing mobile app in eight different languages, reported The Economic Times.
