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ungary has several sites that meet the demanding criteria to be included in the UNESCO World Heritage List. The sites must be of 'outstanding universal value' and meet at least one out of ten selection criteria. The standard of 'outstanding universal value' means that the cultural and/or natural significance is "so exceptional as to transcend national boundaries and to be of common importance for

present and future generations of all humanity."

The caves of Aggtelek Karst and Slovak Karst were designated as a UNESCO World Heritage site in 1995. It sits on the north-eastern border of Hungary with Slovakia and is in both countries. The site is made up of over 1,000 different caves of which 273 are in Hungary. It covers an area of about 564 square kilometres which is slightly more than the T3 New Delhi Airport Terminal.

The longest cave in Hungary extends to 25 kilometres. As per geological data, the cave has been in existence for about two million years. Over aeons, the water of the streams calcium deposits creating the cavities and caverns. The dripping water from the roof of the cavities so formed, contain soluble calcium salts. When the water evaporated, pillars of stalactites and stalagmites of varying shapes and sizes were formed. There is an eerie feeling as one walks through these huge caverns with giant size stalactites and stalagmites. The visitors to these caverns have let their imagination run and given them fancy names like Dragonhead, Columned Chamber, Banquet Hall,

The Room of Lace, The Great Chamber etc. Apparently, one of the stalactites reminded somebody of his or her inlaws. It is called Mother-in-Law's

One of the caverns, called The Concert Hall, has excellent acoustics properties, so much so that popular music concerts are held there. The range of music includes classical and pop music.

Moving on from one subterranean region to another that has the tag of UNESCO World Heritage, is the Christian Necropolis of Pécs, about 200 km from Budapest. The necropolis, a large cemetery, belonging to an ancient city, was built in the 4th century in the town of Sopianae (now Pécs). It was once a part of the Roman Empire. The

necropolis has underground burial chambers and has a memorial chapel above ground to mark the site. These two-storey structures served as burial sites for the nobility and as well as for burial ceremonies.

There are two burial chambers. The first one is called Peter & Paul Tomb, so called because the murals in the underground chamber depict murals of these two apostles. The chamber has lavish paintings of biblical scenes. The second chamber is called the Wine Pitcher because the walls are depicted with the paintings of wine pitchers. These chambers were discovered in the 18th century.

The Roman settlement on which the town of Pécs was built was founded in the early 2nd century AD. In subsequent years, this town would grow to become a significant centre of Christianity, which explains the biblical scenes in the chambers.

In ancient Rome till about 2nd century AD, the dead were was the most common burial rite. 750 ml bottle. The deceased would be taken to Rome's necropolis (city of the dead) and be placed upon a burning pyre. The ashes and remaining bone fragments were interned in a funerary urn. It was only after the 2nd century that burial became the preferred method of funeral rites. The deceased was placed inside a sarcophagus, which was often richly decorated.

intoxicant has been perennial in any form. The 18th century Austrian composer Joseph Haydn, famous for his elegant and witty compositions, received payments in the form of wine. The "nectar" coming from the grapes of this particular wine is mentioned in the national anthem of Hungary. The wine in question is Tokaj, pronounced, toe-kay, the price of cremated. > The Tokaj Wine Region was designated as a UNESCO World Heritage site in 2002. It is in the northeastern part of Hungary. It covers 27 different settlements that reflect the region's living tradition and the culture of wine production. The town of Tokaj has come to represent production of wine in this region. The area covers 5,400hectares of planted vines, and hundreds of small wineries.

Tokaj is about a 2.5-hour drive from Budapest. It is also an important the murky world of caves and the Jewish heritage area. Jewish traders played a vital role in the production, sale and transportation of wine from Tokaj, contributing enormously to its

international recognition across the centuries. Synagogues in Tokaj have been restored, and several wineries are located inside the old homes of Jewish wine merchants.

Grapes have been grown and cultivated in the region since 1561 to make the Tokaj wines. The vineyards, villages and small towns reflect the distinct viticulture tradition of the region. The Roman Emperor Charles VI, in 1737, owing to the importance of this wine region earmarked it as a protected area. The site is also notable for its historic networks of deep wine cellars.

The area, however, owes its fame to a special strand of fungus (a multicellular organism that cannot make its own food) called botrytis. It is this fungus that transforms the overripe grapes into small, shrivelled raisin-like berries with concentrated sugars and flavours. The fungus grows only when weather conditions are perfect. It is the happy combination of the region's terroir that has given this wine its outstanding flavour. 📼

lonesome cry of a bird perched high on a tree pierced the Limpending dawn breaking over the rainforest where I was staying. From my vantage, I could see a green canopy of wooded hills stretched undulating before me. I was standing on the balcony of a tree house in one of the resorts in the hill district of Wayanad in Kerala.

Wayanad district is on the northeast edge of Kerala. It forms the southern end of the Deccan Plateau, where the altitude of the hills ranged from 700 to 2100 meters. It is the highest point in Wayanad district. The district is blessed with rich water resources.

The Wayanad district has the largest tribal population in Kerala. They, unlike in other parts of Kerala, have a patrilineal system of transference of rights, property, and wealth inherited from father to sons. They dwell in forests and still hunt for their food. Animals abound in this region. There are elephants, bears, barking deer, tigers, leopards, and wild dogs. The quiet dawn was a far cry from the raucous welcome I received from the croaking frogs when I reached the resort late in the evening. It was the beginning of the mating season and the amphibians were going about their



business in full swing. I had left Mysore late in the afternoon and had reached Kalpetta, the main town in the Wayanad district. The dusk had already set in. Kalpetta is surrounded by densely wooded hills. Like all hill towns in Kerala, Kalpetta is a busy town with narrow roads where the trundling buses threaten to run you down. Cyclists rush past you, deftly avoiding a head on collision. It is always mealtime here. As I walked down the streets of Kalpetta, I was assailed by delicious smells of Kerala food - fish fry, chicken curry, and bowls of steaming rice and of course the Kerala Parottas were on display.



A 45-minute drive from this town brought me to this resort. Though it was only 6 o'clock, it had considerably of trees, I could see brightly lit tree houses at various levels from the ground. Against the dark silhouette of the mountains, the brightly lit cabins looked friendly and cosy. The pathways were lit with lights that shone directly on the cemented path. My 'house' was a good five minutes' walk from the reception office. The roughly cemented winding pathway led me up the hill.

My house was about 8-10 metres above the ground on a huge Jackfruit tree. A short flight of wooden steps led me to the room. It was a one room apartment with an attached restroom room. The wooden apartment was sparsely, but tastefully furnished.

From my balcony, it was all inky darkness all round. It was 7: 30 in the evening and the forest was plunged into still clung to the trees. Spent with the darkness. Between the dense foliage, I could discern lights of the other apartments in the resort. Above the cacophony of the frogs that were doing

their best to outdo their competing mates to capture the hearts of their lady love, I could hear the gurgling of a darkened and through the dense foliage stream far down the hill. It was too dark to go exploring.

The dining hall was a common area propped up on stilts. It was a sprawling hall dexterously constructed with bamboo, burnished teak wood and tiles. With dimly lit lights all round, the effect was immensely pleasing to the eye. The buffet meal that was spread out for our delectation was a quintessential Kerala meal. There were appams and stews, string hoppers and coconut chutney, parotta with chicken fry and of course the ubiquitous dosa with sambar. Fish curry cooked in freshly extracted coconut milk, is a delight to have, far and a balcony that ran the length of the different from the traditional fish curry.

Next morning the cry of the birds enticed me to go exploring the area. I walked downhill towards the source of the sound of the stream. Tufts of mists night long promotion of their virility, the frogs had quietened down, only to be replaced by the more pleasantsounding calls of the birds.

The sun had not yet penetrated the dark depths of the forest. It was a rivulet that noisily swept over moth fringed craggy rocks. I stepped into the cool waters. The big fishes darted away at my approach. The small silvered coloured fishes were bolder and fearlessly nibbled on my feet and legs.

A long hanging bridge was suspended across the rivulet. Standing under the dense canopy of leaves and branches, I had a clear view of the river bed. I could see myriad fishes in perpetual motion in search of food. It was a good experience walking on that swaying bridge.

If frogs are there, then snakes cannot be far behind. Whereas most animals would avoid eating frogs because of the juice they secrete on their body when danger looms, the snakes find it irresistibly juicy! As I walked along the cemented path, lying directly across was the skin of the snake. It was about a metre and a half long. On the rough surface of the path, it had managed to get rid of its skin. The process is called moulting. It brought home the fact this was snake country and I had to tread carefully. Several species of snakes are found here, both poisonous and non-poisonous.

While in Wayanad, there are several interesting places to see. The Edakkal Caves or rather rock shelter, are one of the oldest human settlements discovered in India. Edakkal means a boulder in between. It is a boulder that has got wedged between two bigger ones. Reportedly, they date back to 6000 years BC.

The Kabini River, a tributary of Kaveri or Cauvery River, originates at Wayanad. Varambetta mosque is one of the oldest Muslim mosques of Wayanad dating back to the 18th century. The mosque has no restrictions for entry. People of all religions can pass through its portals. Wayanad also has the only Lava-Kusha temple in Kerala. It is the only known temple to have the deities of Lava and Kusha, children of Rama and Sita. The temple was also built sometime in the 18th century.

Living in a treehouse in Kerala was a wonderful experience. Its architectural designs conformed to a classical Kerala house. The materials used are autochthonous such as bamboo, coir, and palm leaves. I spent most of my time sitting on the balcony reading a book. When I pause in my reading and look out, I see a vast expanse of treetops, in various shades of green. Birds flit by. Dragonflies, defying science, hover immobile in the air, before darting away. A kaleidoscope of butterflies silently flutters by. I am left alone again in silence. I return to my reading. 🖻

From beaches to museums, Gujarat has many enjoyable and educational destinations for families with children.



## **ENJOY THE SANDS AT MANDVI BEACH**

Mandvi in Kutch is a coastal town fringed by some fine beaches. Visit the Vijay Vilas Palace, a grand royal palace with princely memorabilia and a superb view from its terrace over the grounds towards the sea. The palace grounds run along a sandy beach. The sands here are soft and ideal for walking, and

from here you can wade and paddle in shallow waters. Children will enjoy making sand castles and playing on the sanded beach. There are resorts and camps facing the beaches for accommodations and food.

Visit the town with its historical buildings and handicraft market. You can watch ocean-worthy dhows and

boats being built on the river and flamingos at the creeks. You can see Batik at the Vivekanand Gramodyog Society in Mandvi, bandhani work at Mashru weaving at Mau.

Don't miss trying the famous dabeli and masala cone of Mandvi, and a thali at Zorba - the Buddha Restaurant.

## **STAY AT A RESORT IN KANDLA**

A short drive from Kandla Airport brings you to large resorts that offer wide-ranging facilities for children. The 17.5 acres Holiday Village Resort is one of the best. As you enter the resort, you come to the sprawling lawns around which the cottages are built. Each of the cottages blends traditional

architectural elements with modern and deluxe amenities. Near the cottages is the water park, which has water play areas, water slides, water coasters and children's pools. This resort also has an indoor kid's zone with toys, slides, playing equipment and caretakers to keep children engaged. For children who like sports, there is a swimming pool and various sports at the club. The restaurant team is also happy to customise dishes for the needs of children.



## LEARN ABOUT DINOSAURS AT BALASINOR

Just 86 km from Ahmedabad, Balasinor lies at the nucleus of one of the largest dinosaur fossil sites in the world. A short distance from the town, Raiyoli has become famous in palaeontology circles for the huge number of dinosaur eggs found at the

The Garden Palace at Balasinor offers accommodations in a heritage hotel and its garden cottages. This property has its own farms where children can be introduced to

From here, drive to the dinosaur museum, which has interactive exhibits, 5-D theatre, digital forest, 360-degree virtual reality, experiment laboratory, semi-circulation project, 3D projection mapping and hologram. The museum offers information about the 13 species of dinosaurs whose fossils have been found in this belt. A short distance from here, the fossil park at Raiyoli has 65 million year old fossils of dinosaurs.

Tours are operated by Aaliya Babi from the royal family of Balasinor of the fossil zone.

As you head for Dwarka, you come to Okha Madhi near which is a long and beautiful sandy beach. Along this beach is a Turtle Hatchery. The western coast of Kathiawad is an important breeding zone for endangered green sea turtles. The green sea turtles are among the largest of marine turtles with a gleaming olive carapace, unique in being herbivorous. They lay eggs on the beaches, and the hatchlings have a perilous journey to the sea when they can fall prey to gulls and other birds, crabs, stray dogs and other predators. Eggs in potentially dangerous areas for the hatchlings are collected and kept in the hatchery. Children will enjoy seeing

represent the architecture of the Gujarat Sultanate, and there are wellplanned parking areas. Walk along the promenade to enjoy views of the lake which was created in the 15th century. The 34-sided lake has an island garden in the centre and the Nagina Wadi Gardens. You can watch herons and other birds at the lake.

The lakefront has been rejuvenated with a pedestrian-only recreational area. Take a morning toy train ride on the Atal Express, a toy train. Proceed from here to see the gardens and fountains. A little further away is the tethered balloon – get into the basket and go up in the balloon for a superb panoramic view of the city. Nearby, you

can hire a Segway - a two-wheel balancing vehicle, for a ride around the lake. A number of aquatic activities and boating can be enjoyed at the lake.

Leave the promenade and visit Kid's City, which is like a miniature scaled down world for children, where they learn through realistic role-play at micro-versions of a fire station, a post office, a police station and other utilities.

From the lakefront, you can access the Kamala Nehru Hill Garden Zoological Park is one of the most visited zoos in India. The zoo was started in the 1950s by the Ahmedabad Municipal Corporation with the late Reuben David as its first superintendent. The zoo became

famous for the interest David took in each of the animals, its breeding record of lesser flamingo, water monitor and various endangered species, and its record of maintaining albino specimens of many mammals and birds. There is a good collection of big cats, herbivores, monkeys, birds and reptiles. Don't miss seeing the Nicobar pigeons.

Near the zoo is the Balvatika, a children's park with a maze of mirrors and other attractions. There is also an informative Natural History Museum with dioramas featuring stuffed animals and birds in their natural habitat. The Butterfly Park is a garden that has been landscaped to create a habitat for butterflies – walk around the park to see butterflies feeding on various flowers.

From Kankaria, travel to the Shreyas Campus, which has two

### TAKE A NATURE AND CULTURE BREAK IN BHAVNAGAR

Situated along the eastern coast of the Kathiawad peninsula, wellknown as Saurashtra, Bhavnagar has attractive parks that are good for nature lovers.

This city was founded in 1723 AD as the seat of power of the Gohil Rajput rulers of the area, and saw much development between the 1860s and 1940s. The legacy of this period includes a number of impressive buildings like the Takhtsinhji Hospital, the High Court, Sir Alfred School and the Barton Library that can be seen when driving around the city. Those interested in architecture, must visit the Takthsinhiji Hospital, which was built between 1879 and 1883. This hospital building was designed by Sir William Emerson, whose works include Kolkata's Victoria Memorial, Allahabad's Muir College and Mumbai's Crawford Market. From here, you can continue to the Takhteshwar temple, raised on a hill in the south of town, which is a

popular place for a view over the city to the coast. Travel northeast to the Barton Museum which occupies a crescent-shaped building set facing a circle with a clock tower in the centre. The museum has a collection of Buddhist, Jain and Hindu statues, mediaeval bronzes, Harappan terracotta, farming implements and folk crafts. Upstairs, Gandhi Smriti Museum exhibits old sepia photos and Mahatma Gandhi's memorabilia. The top floor of the crescent-shaped 1890s museum building has a collection of handicrafts from all over India. Shops selling khadi and handmade products are located in the adjacent buildings. In the heart of the city, the attractive Ganga Jalia temple, a fountain-fed water body, markets and the former palace called Darbargadh are worth visiting.

The university area has some historical college buildings erected by the Maharajas of Bhavnagar who were patrons of education. The Samaldas Arts College was the first institution of higher learning in Saurashtra during the 1880s. A plaque states that Mahatma Gandhi went to college in Bhavnagar.

In the early morning or in the evening, don't miss a walk at Victoria Park. The permissible walking trail passes woodland, scrub and a lake, and offers views of low hills. A variety of birds, small mammals and reptiles can be seen along the walking trail. Nearby, Bhor Talao or Gaurishankar Lake was built as a water storage resource for Bhavnagar. Walk along the embankments to spot wbbbater birds.

From Bhavnagar, it is a drive of about an hour to Adhelui from where you can turn off the highway for Velavadar National Park. The drive off the highway to the park's entrance passes a river and flooded fields - stay alert on this road for sightings of wolf, jackal and other mammals that come to drink water, as also birdlife like sarus crane that frequents the fields. Presently, you come to the entrance of the national park. The park is relatively small, spanning about 34 sq km, but there is much to be seen on the drivable dirt tracks that run past Savannah-type grasslands, thorny scrub and wetlands. On the way, there are a couple of watch towers that offer good views over the grasslands. From the track

or the watchtower, you can see large herds of Indian antelope called blackbuck, usually in groups of about 50 each. The male blackbuck has a striking blackish brown and white colour and beautiful spiraling horns, which make it one of the most elegant antelopes in the world. The does and immature males are yellowish fawn in colour.

February-March is usually the peak rutting time for blackbuck - you may see the males strutting around with its head facing upwards so that its horns lie along its back. The males set up territory and defend their harem from rivals. The grasslands abound in birds like larks, shrikes, drongos, wheatears, quails, francolins and there are chances of seeing cranes in winter. The Stolikza's bush chat is one of the globally threatened birds that can be seen in the park. Eagles, hawks and falcons hunt in the grasslands. You can see flocks of sand grouse coming to the rivers and water ponds in the park, usually about midmorning.

As evening approaches, there are chances of seeing carnivores like the Indian wolf, striped hyena and jungle



Vadodara or Baroda has been cat. Gujarat's Art and Culture Capital from the late-1800s when Maharaja Sayajirao Gaekwad of Baroda patronised art in the city. Take your children to the 19th century City Museum with Tamil paintings, Tibetan-Buddhist art, Mughal-period miniature paintings and manuscripts, oil paintings from Europe, plaster images of classical works meant as role models for aspiring artists, tribal art and a portrait gallery. There are other museums in the park that exhibit details about nutrition and the sciences. The museum complex is located in the Kamati Baug which is a large park with a zoo and a vintage toy train that once belonged to the Maharaja of Baroda.

## VISIT THE PARKS AND MUSEUMS OF VADODARA

A short drive from the park, the Lukshmi Vilas Palace has vast collections of princely memorabilia. You can also see Chinese and Japanese art, Ravi Varma's portraits and European paintings at the Maharaja Fatehsinhrao Museum in the magnificent Lakshmi Vilas Palace complex. While in the city, check up on information about art exhibitions at the art galleries like Sarjan, Kalanidhi and Lenxus.

Proceed to Ajwa lake and Nimeta, famous for its gardens, and then to the World Heritage Site of Champaner-Pavagadh. Here, you can see many historical monuments.

Children will enjoy the ropeway ride to the Pavagadh hilltop.



## WATCH WILDLIFE AT GIR

Summer is a good time to visit the Gir Wildlife Sanctuary. During these hot months, lion and leopard sightings at water holes are frequent. This 1412 sq km wildlife reserve comprises deciduous forests, semievergreen and evergreen riverine flora, thorn-scrub jungle, grasslands and rocky areas with seven rivers flowing through it. Driving in an open vehicle in the hill tracts of this wildlife sanctuary, with its deciduous forests, grasslands and scrub, is a pleasant and often exciting experience as alarm calls and pugmarks indicate that a big cat is on the prowl. Other than the lion, Gir is also one of the best places in India for leopard sightings especially in parts of the park where there are

## **VISIT THE PARKS OF STATUE OF UNITY**

Well-known as the site for the world's largest statue, SOU is also a great destination to enjoy with your children.

The Jungle Safari covers 375 acres at seven different levels ranging from an altitude or elevation of 29 metres to 180 metres on the right bank of the Narmada River near the Statue of Unity. The park is a home to more than 186 species of fauna,

covering various biomes of Africa, Australia, Asia and America. The safari route goes through an open-air zoo where mammals can be seen in landscapes similar to their natural habitats. The Fly High Aviary is a walkthrough enclosure, where you can get close to a variety of birds. The Cactus Garden has a variety of cacti and succulents from different lands.

You can stay at the Tent City Narmada.



large langur populations. Gir is also an important habitat of chousingha, the world's only four horned antelope, but this diminutive mammal is not easy to spot among the vegetation. Keep a watch among the trees for the birdlife too - magnificent eagles and attractive birds like the paradise flycatcher, golden oriole, hoopoe, blue jay roller, flame back woodpecker and painted francolin are often seen during the drive. The most scenic place in the reserve is the Kamleshwar reservoir, where you can get excellent crocodile sightings.

Children will enjoy the wildlife zone at Devaliya, where you get close views of lions.

right Chinese lanterns strung across the street greet you at the entrance of the Raohe Street Night Market. It is more than half a kilometre in length and very popular with tourists. There are over 400 restaurants, including Michelin rated establishments. Some of the delicacies available are deep-fried potato spiral, Tofu pudding, beef noodles, oyster vermicelli, stinky tofu, etc.

The unpalatable name not withstanding, Stinky Tofu is immensely popular among the Taiwanese. It is also popular in China and Indonesia. It is a Chinese form of fermented tofu that has a strong smell and is usually

sold at roadside stalls rather than in restaurants. Traditionally the dish is made by soaking the tofu in brine, vegetables, shrimp, and with a few other ingredients. The fermented tofu is then deep fried and served with chili sauce.

You can also shop for souvenirs, cheap electronics, clothing, and other accessories. And if you are excruciatingly uncertain about your future, do not worry; there are fortunetellers with parrots that will tell you exactly what the future holds for you - a game plan very similar to the ones that you see in India.

Shilin Night Market in Taipei is Taiwan's most famous and one of the largest night markets in Taiwan. It has been in operation since 1909. Smelly Tofu is a specialty of this market. The shops turn into alleys and lanes, where one can discover exotic foods unique to this market.

Huaxi Night Market began in 1951 and is especially popular among the tourists. It is in Taipei city. It is a long

corridor lined on both sides with stalls. The corridor, brightly lit with lanterns, is wide enough for people to sit and enjoy their meals. It is also known as Snake Alley Night Market. In this market you can enjoy definitely not a place for people the Chinese herbal cuisine, cooked with snakes.

Traditional Chinese medicine is predicated on the belief that snakes have important restorative and

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But having set the record straight about fears and likes and dislikes, a bacchanal would be tempted to make a sly visit to this place. One of the intriguing items on sale is a drink called the snake wine.

How is snake wine made? Before proceeding further, let me warn you that it is not meant for the queasy. An entire live snake is dropped into a jar of rice wine or any other alcohol for several months. The ethanol in the alcohol acts as a catalyst to break down the venom into a harmless fluid. Alternatively, the head of the reptile is cut off and the spurting blood is poured into a glass and mixed with alcohol. Believe it or not, macabre it may look or sound, but the snake wine is a popular drink in Taiwan.

Coming to more palatable items, pork ribs stewed in traditional Chinese medicine, is a dish that is a runaway winner. Authentic Chinese medicinal food dishes are prepared according to traditional recipes and techniques based on ancient ideas about how the human body operates. Chinese herbal medicines in cuisines date back to 200 BC and are compiled in an ancient book called, The Yellow Emperor's Classic of Internal Medicine. The text gives advice on what to eat for different health conditions.

> Iron Eggs - They are chicken, pigeon, or quail eggs that have been repeatedly stewed in a tea, soy sauce, and spice, before being air-dried. The process shrinks the eggs, turns them a dark brown colour. **•**
