**Beautiful Yet Unexplored** Hill Stations of India

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If Uttarakhand brings up images of its spiritual richness in your mind, think twice. The land can surprise you with one of its lesser known hill stations - Lansdowne. See it to believe it.

n 2022, Lansdowne, a lesser known hill station of Uttarakhand, grabbed media attention not for its physical beauty or colonial connection. The defence ministry proposed changing names of roads, schools, towns, and other establishments built post independence and named after the top brass of British defence services and administration. However, nothing of the sort happened and this potential tourist trap is still known as Lansdowne.

Travellers across the world are enthralled by Uttarakhand for its natural and spiritual wealth, which are till date dominated by a few names, viz. Mussoorie, Dhanaulti, Auli, Nainital, Chakrata, Munsiyari, Badrinath, Kedarnath, Gangotri and Yamunotri. However, people have now got another reason to visit this land of Gods. With thick oak and blue pine forests, the town can surprise even the most jaded traveller.

Lansdowne is situated at an altitude of 1,700 metres above sea level, and is known for its natural beauty, tranquil atmosphere, and pleasant climate. It was originally established as a cantonment town by the British in 1887, and was named after then Viceroy of India, Lord Lansdowne.

History lovers would be fascinated to know that Lansdowne was developed as the training centre of Garhwal Rifles, an infantry regiment of the Indian army. The town was home to activities of freedom fighters; today, the town is one of the quietest hill stations of India. Unlike other hill stations in India, Lansdowne is connected with other cities of Uttarakhand with motorable roads. For students of architecture, Lansdowne offers buildings and churches built during the British era. Notable Places to Visit

Garhwal Rifles Regimental Museum, also called Darwan Singh Sanghralaya, houses artefacts from the beginning of the Regiment. The Garhwal Rifles participated in the two world wars amongst other battles through its more than 100 years of history. Many artifacts, including photographs, arms used by regimental commanders, captured weapons, campaign history and other information are displayed. There are medals won by erstwhile Garhwal Rifle soldiers that have been put on display, including the Victoria Cross awarded to Darwan Singh Negi and Gabar Singh Negi.



arade Ground at the Garhwal Rifles Center boasts a War Memorial. which is a major attraction for visitors. Before you go there, prior permission must be obtained from the military authority. Among other places of interest are Tip n Top View Point, Kaleshwar Mahadev Temple (the most visited Temple in Lansdowne and attracts thousands of devotees during monsoon), Santoshi Mata Temple, Regimental Museum (also called the Darwan Singh Sanghralaya), Bhullatal Lake, St. Mary's Church, and Lover's lane.

Almost all the popular destinations in India are associated with gods and goddesses. Shiv, the supreme power, is present everywhere. Lansdowne couldn't remain untouched from the omnipresence of the Supreme God.



arkeshwar Mahadev Temple is an ancient temple dedicated to Lord Shiva and located in the midst of a dense forest. The temple is known for its beautiful architecture, intricate carvings, and peaceful surroundings. Visitors can also go on a trek to reach the temple. Legend goes that Tarkasur was a demon who worshipped Lord Shiva at this location for a boon. Pleased by his devotion, Lord Shiva gave him a boon of immortality as per Tarkasur request except from Lord Shiva's son. Tarkasur began to abuse this boon and started killing saints and threatening gods. Sages asked for help from Lord Shiva. Disturbed by wrongdoings of Tarkasur, Lord Shiva married Parvati and Kartikeya was born. Kartikeya soon killed Tarkasur but at the time of death Tarkasur made a prayer to Lord Shiva and asked for pardon. Mahadev then attached his name to the temple where Tarkasur meditated once. Hence the place is named Tarkeshwar Mahadev.

Tarkeshwar Mahadev is a village 36 km from Lansdowne and at a height of 1,800 m. The temple committee provides a dharamshala for accommodation. At Lansdown, you will find many hotels for stay. It is a good place for a family trip for 1–2 days.

# Other Places of Interest

**Bhullatal**, a manmade lake dedicated to the Garhwali youth of the Garhwal Rifles who helped in construction of the lake, located at just 1 km from Lansdowne, India. Bhulla in Garhwali language means younger brother. Bhullatal is also known as Bhulla Lake.

**Bhairav Garhi Temple** is dedicated to Lord Bhairav, who is believed to be an incarnation of Lord Shiva. The temple is located on a hilltop and offers stunning views of the surrounding landscape. Visitors can also enjoy a picnic or a hike in the nearby forests.

**Bhim Pakora** is a unique natural formation consisting of two large stones that are balanced on top of each other. Legend has it that Bhim, one of the Pandavas from the Hindu epic Mahabharata, placed these stones here with his superhuman strength. Visitors can also enjoy a scenic hike to reach this spot.

**Sharadotsava** is an annual festival celebrated in Lansdowne during the autumn season (usually in October). The festival is a celebration of the harvest season and features cultural programs, music, dance, and food stalls.

**Old Cemetery** is a historic cemetery located in Kitchner Lines and is the final resting place of many British soldiers who died during te colonial period. The graves date back to the mid-1850s and offer a glimpse into the town's rich history.

**Gauri Kund** is a Hindu pilgrimage site and base camp for trekking to Kedarnath Temple, in Uttarakhand, India. It is situated at an altitude of 6502 feet above mean sea level in the Garhwal Himalayas.

Summing up, Lansdowne is a great place to relax, unwind, and enjoy the natural beauty of the Himalayan region and cultural heritage of Uttarakhand.

- Kotdwar railway station: 44 kms
- Jolly Grant Airport, near Dehradun: 152 kms via Kotdwar-Haridwar road
- Road from Delhi via Meerut, Bijnore, Najibabad, Kotdwar and to Lansdowne

The destination comes alive during the winter months when the festival of Rann Utsav is celebrated with great zeal. The white salt desert, dotted with colourful handicraft stalls, soulful cultural performances, delicious kutchi food as well as tented and traditional stay at White Rann Resort offers a surreal and mesmerising view that is perfect for photography.



👝 aputara: Saputara, a hill station in the Dang district of Gujarat, is a popular tourist destination and also a great place for photography. The only hill station of Gujarat is popular for the weekend travellers for pleasant weather, wide and scenic roads to drive on and sightseeing. There are many places to visit in Saputara, including a handful of ancient historical buildings. The hill station offers stunning views of the Sahyadri Range, the lush green forests, and the gushing waterfalls that are a treat for photography enthusiasts.

odhera Sun Temple: The Modhera Sun Temple, located in the Mehsana district of Gujarat, is a stunning example of ancient Indian architecture and a UNESCO world heritage site. ir Forest National Park: The Gir Forest National Park, located in the Saurashtra region of Gujarat, is the only natural habitat of the Asiatic Lion. The park is also home to several other species of wildlife and offers breathtaking landscapes that are perfect for wildlife and landscape photography. From the wildlife perspective, Sasan Gir National Park holds a significant place in the list of the favourite wildlife destinations for passionate wildlife explorers. The forest provides ample opportunity to photograph birds, landscapes and mammals, even portraits of the local tribal people. Devalia Safari Park, approximately 13km away from Gir National Park, is another attraction in the vicinity to click the best photos with the rich flora and fauna in the backdrop.

Vapi, at a distance of 12 km, lies on the Mumbai - Ahmedabad National Highway No. 8 and is easily connected to Daman by road. Khijadiya Bird Sanctuary is bird watchers' heaven. Spread across 605 hectares of land, this bird reserve offers shelter to more than 220 species of migratory and resident birds.

ach morning, the rising sun is greeted with the grand open-air concert held by more than 220 species of birds; the melodies are sweet seductions to which you would happily sacrifice your early morning nap. The natural singers continue their mellifluous singing during winters. If you wonder where such a miracle happens, visit Khijadiya Bird Sanctuary in Gujarat.

I know a dubious mind would like to challenge my claims; well, they can travel to this sanctuary in Jamnagar,



a coastal district belonging to the Saurashtra region of the state. This sanctuary is a must-go destination for bird watchers and lovers as it is home to myriad, colourful birds like pelicans, flamingos, spoonbills, ducks, egrets, and herons.

# Location

The biggest bird sanctuary in Gujarat, Khijadiya Bird Sanctuary is located 12 kms away from Jamnagar. The area was conferred the status of sanctuary on November 6, 1982. Salt waters and fresh waters are two major parts that divide the sanctuary.

# About the Land

Khijadiya is India's 49th Ramsar site; the sanctuary gained status of a wetland of International Importance on February 02, 2022. Now an eco-tourist village, the destination hosted the International Bird Watcher's Conference during winter of 2010.

# **Species of Birds**

Khijadiya Bird Sanctuary attracts a number of migratory birds along with resident birds. Black-necked stork deserves a special mention as these ducks are not found easily anywhere in India, and found in abundance in the sanctuary.

The sanctuary sees migratory and resident birds like Grey hypocolius, Forest wagtail, Grey-necked bunting, Black-headed bunting, Greylag goose, European roller, black-necked stork, Great white pelican, Dalmatian pelican, Lesser flamingo, Greater flamingo, great crested grebe,

shikra, Indian spotted eagle, black ibis, Blue-cheeked bee-eater, Barn swallow, Crested lark, Isabelline shrike, black-winged kite, brahminy kite, pheasant-tailed jacana, great thick-knee, common greenshank, grey francolin, imperial eagle, little tern, black-tailed godwit, knob-billed duck, common crane, common teal, dunlin, garganey, Gadwall, marsh harrier, northern pintail, shoveler, Whistling ducks, Eurasian wigeon, pale harrier, demoiselle, cormorants and darters.





# **Other Attractions**

Although the sanctuary never ceases to surprise visitors, in case you want to explore other beauties of the land, you can visit Ranmal Lake, Bhujiyo Kotho, and Khambaliya Gate.

Ranmal Lake is just a 15-km drive from Jamnagar railway station. Also known as Lakhota Lake, this water body is in the middle of Jamnagar city and is spread over 5 lakh square metres. This lake is said to have been constructed by Jam Ranmalji II between 1820 and 1852. On the south of Ranmal Lake is situated Bhujiyo Kotho, which is a bastion that tells an interesting story. Legend has it that the kings of Jamnagar and Bhuj were brothers; both built their kingdoms about 300 kms apart. This Bhujiyo bastion was presumably the entrance to a secret passage from Jamnagar to Bhuj.

Khambaliya Gate was built in memory of Raja Jamraval of Jamnagar. This gigantic gate was built in the 17th century by Wazir Meraman Khawa. The local authorities restored the former glory of this marvellous structure.

# Where to Stay?

Jamnagar is one of the leading cities of Saurashtra - Gujarat. Since the district hosts production facilities of large Indian companies like Reliance, there are countless options for visitors to stay.



# How to get there?

## By Road

The sanctuary is connected with major cities of Gujarat state such as Jamnagar (14 kms), Rajkot (75.9 kms) and Ahmedabad (268 kms) through a road network.

## **By Train**

The nearest railway station is Jamnagar junction, which is around 16.9 kms from the Sanctuary and it takes about 30 minutes to reach.

## By Air

The nearest airport is at Jamnagar, from where visitors can catch regular flights to travel to the rest of the country. Jamnagar airport is located at a distance of approximately 24.2 kms from the sanctuary and it takes about 26 minutes to reach.

# Maa Kamakhya Corridor A Spiritual and Cultural Landmark in Northeast India

An ambitious initiative of the Assam State Government, the Maa Kamakhya Corridor Project, aims to provide better connectivity and infrastructure to the Kamakhya Temple.

ndia is a land of diverse religions and cultures with a rich history and heritage that has attracted tourists from all over the world for centuries. One of the major reasons for this is the country's religious sites, which are not only significant for Indian tourists but also for foreign tourists with a fascination for the cultural and historical value they hold.

Hon'ble Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi, a follower of Sanatan Dharma, is relentlessly working towards reviving the revered Hindu pilgrimage sites. The development works at Ayodhya, Kashi, Ujjain, and various religious circuits are examples of his commitment. The inauguration of Mahakal Lok Corridor at the Mahakaleshwar Temple in October 2022 received a wide scale appreciation for its well thought-out planning and impeccable implementation. The Kashi Vishwanath Mandir, too, has undergone a magnificent transformation under the leadership of Prime Minister Narendra Modi who inaugurated the Kashi Vishwanath Dham Corridor project in December 2021.

Drawing inspiration from the Kashi-Vishwanath Corridor, Maa Kamakhya Corridor has been initiated by the Assam State Government. Taking to Twitter on April 18, Assam Chief Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma shared a glimpse of how the renovated Maa Kamakhya corridor would look like in the near future. Responding to Shri Himanta Biswa Sarma, Shri Narendra Modi shared on Twitter, "I am sure Maa Kamakhya corridor will be a landmark initiative. Kashi Vishwanath Dham and Shree Mahakal Mahalok have been transformative as far as the spiritual experience is concerned. Equally important is the fact that tourism is enhanced and the local economy gets a boost."

Located in Assam, the Kamakhya Temple is one of the most revered shrines in the country, attracting thousands of devotees and tourists every year. The temple is among the 51 Shaktipeeths where parts of the Goddess Sati's body fell after she self-immolated in a sacrificial fire. It is believed that the yoni of the Goddess Sati fell at this location, making it one of the most powerful centers of feminine energy in the country. Ambubachi Mela, the annually organized mela at the temple celebrating the Goddess's menstrual cycle is another attraction of this place.



# Maa Kamakhya Corridor Project - Developments

n ambitious initiative of the Assam State Government, the Maa Kamakhya Corridor project, aims to provide better connectivity and infrastructure to the Kamakhya Temple. The project will expand the temple's surrounding area from 3,000 sq ft to about 100,000 sq ft across three levels. Six major temples in the complex, which are currently hidden from the larger public view, will be restored to their original glory.

To ease the crowd during major festivals like Ambubachi Mela, the project will create space for 8,000-10,000 pilgrims. It will provide ease of access for divyang and elderly pilgrims. The access corridor will widen from about 8-10 ft to about 27-30 ft.

The Maa Kamakhya Corridor project is expected to boost tourism and provide economic opportunities for the people of the region. Along with promoting the rich cultural and spiritual heritage of Northeast India, the project will create awareness about the importance of preserving and promoting such heritage.

# **Tourism Policy 2022**

he Assam Government has been constantly working towards strengthening tourism support with its noteworthy initiatives. Recently, Tourism Policy 2022 was released by the Department of Tourism, Government of Assam with the objective of driving sustainable development in the state. "Our goal with this new policy is to enable the world to view it from the point of view of attraction. The presence of pristine water, forests, mountains and rivers provides the state with limitless possibilities in the field of tourism. The new tourism policy reflects the same goal. Assam is sure to enchant the travellers with what it has to offer at every nook and corner. For investors, we have also come up with special packages," Assam Tourism Minister Shri Jayanta Malla Baruah was quoted as saying during the launch event in November 2022.

hat is common between Makar Sankranti in India and Hamamatsu Festival in Japan? Sounds incredible, right? Well, there is a strong connection between the two festivals as both are citizen festivals and both involve kite flying. Every year, during the first week of May, people of Japan celebrate Hamamatsu Kite Festival. The largest festival in Japan, Hamamatsu attracts more than two million people to celebrate this kite flying jamboree.

Nearly five centuries old gala is celebrated following a legend. Lord of Hikuma Castle, who ruled Hamamatsu and the surrounding area, first flew kites on the birth of his first son. Since then, people flock the Nakatajima sand dunes to fly kites along with their children. During May, the climate is conducive to flying kites because of strong wind known as "Enshu Karakaze". The entire week is called Golden Week (Ōgon Shūkan) in the country. From 10 am in the morning to 3 pm in the afternoon, people engage themselves in kite battles (Takogassen) with their neighbours. The festival reaches its crescendo with the shouting of 'Oisho, oisho' by participants.

On receiving signals of the sound of fireworks, fliers begin to fly kites with their firstborn child, dressed in festival costume, in their arms. Participants fly more than 170 Kenka Tako, i.e. kites and take pleasure in cutting other kites' string through friction. Night Parade

A procession with decorative floats brightens up the night as merrymakers take part in this ostentatious parade in the evening. The parade gets a touch of music as children play traditional musical instruments (flutes and drums) and adults carry lanterns and flags. This entire scene becomes a mesmerising spectacle as everybody makes noise, cheering and chanting slogans.

The largest festival in Japan showcases its culture through food and other items on display on floats. Since festivities take place at two different places, local authorities run shuttle buses for revellers to commute from one place to another.
